

SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Polk County.

Dept. No. 2.

Broadmead Farm Co., a corporation, Plaintiff, vs. Alice I. Mead and Alice I. Mead, as administratrix of the estate of Volney C. Mead, deceased, Ethel Marie White and Harry M. White, her husband and Pierre D. Mead, a minor, Defendants.

To Harry M. White and Pierre D. Mead of the above named defendants:

In the Name of the State of Oregon. You and each of you are hereby required and summoned to be and appear in the above entitled court and cause within six weeks from and after the date of the first publication of this summons and if you fail to so appear or answer plaintiff's complaint within said time the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in said complaint against you and each of you and said other defendants, to-wit: For a decree decreeing plaintiff to be the owner of and you and each of you to have no right, title, interest or estate in or to the hereinafter described lands in Polk County, Oregon, and decreeing said lands to have been held by V. C. Mead in his life time as only in trust for the use and benefit of the plaintiff corporation and for a decree against you and each of you declaring plaintiff to be the owner in fee simple of all of said lands described as follows, to-wit:
