

SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Polk County.

Dept. No. 2.

Broadmead Farm Co., a corporation, Plaintiff, vs. Alice I. Mead and Alice I. Mead, as administratrix of the estate of Volney C. Mead, deceased, Ethel Marie White and Harry M. White, her husband and Pierre D. Mead, a minor, Defendants.

To Harry M. White and Pierre D. Mead of the above named defendants:

In the Name of the State of Oregon. You and each of you are hereby required and summoned to be and appear in the above entitled court and cause within six weeks from and after the date of the first publication of this summons and if you fail to so appear or answer plaintiff's complaint within said time the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in said complaint against you and each of you and said other defendants, to-wit: For a decree decreeing plaintiff to be the owner of and you and each of you to have no right, title, interest or estate in or to the hereinafter described lands in Polk County, Oregon, and decreeing said lands to have been held by V. C. Mead in his life time as only in trust for the use and benefit of the plaintiff corporation and for a decree against you and each of you declaring plaintiff to be the owner in fee simple of all of said lands described as follows, to-wit:

DELICIOUS CORN MUFFINS.



Here's an old fashioned recipe for corn muffins that has recently been revived and used with unusual success in several of the larger New York hotels: To make three and a half dozen muffins take one quart milk, six ounces butter substitute, twelve ounces of light syrup or honey, four eggs, pinch of salt, two ounces baking powder, one and a half pounds cornmeal and one and a half pounds rye flour. The butter and syrup should be thoroughly mixed; then add the eggs gradually. Pour in the milk and add the rye flour mixed with cornmeal and baking powder.

WHEATLESS BISCUITS.



Parched cornmeal is the feature of these excellent wheatless biscuits. First, the cornmeal—one-half a cup—is put in a shallow pan placed in the oven and stirred frequently until it is a delicate brown. The other ingredients are a teaspoon of salt, a cup of peanut butter and one and a half cups of water. Mix the peanut butter, water and salt and heat. While this mixture is hot stir in the meal which should also be hot. Beat thoroughly. The dough should be of such consistency that it can be dropped from a spoon. Bake in small cakes in an ungreased pan. This makes 16 biscuits, each of which contains one-sixth of an ounce of protein.

Carrot Pudding

1 C raw carrots grated
1 C raw potatoes grated
1 C sugar
1 1/2 C flour (1/2 cornmeal may be used)
1 C raisins or currants
1/2 C butter, suet or any preferred substitute
1/2 t cinnamon
1/2 t cloves,
1/2 t salt
1 t soda dissolved in a very little warm water. Steam three hours, place in slow oven 15 minutes. Serve with cream.
