## Over the Top

By an American Soldier Who Went ARTHUR GUY EMPEY

When the Lusitania was sunk Arthur Guy Empey decided that he could not wait for his country to declare war - s he sailed without orders for England, and enlisted as a Canadian
He recounts this incident in "OVER THE TOP" in less than five hundred words. In a few thousand more words he completes his experiences in England - and after that he is in France-for the greater part of the eighteen month before he was invalided home, in the "Front Line Trenches."
