I want to tell you not to believe the things you hear concerning the Red Cross sweaters and socks. You know the German spies have started all sorts of stories about them. The one about the woman finding a sweater she had knitted for sale in a store is an example of them. It just goes to show that the Germans would like to cause the Red Cross to let up on their good work. I can assure you that the boys appreciate anything the Red Cross sends them. I will close, thank you again for the socks.
