Some of the boys are finding it necessary to miss a day occasionally in order to help along the work at home and provision has been made whereby the work lost in this way can be made up, providing the absences are not too numerous.

Last year a recommend went out from the higher officials that high school and college boys be permitted to quit their studies early and be given full credit, providing they went to work on a farm. As a result of this action school work suffered so much that these same officials are now recommending that all boys be kept in school for it is recognized that they will be of greater worth to the government and to themselves if they remain at their studies.
