Corvallis, Ore., June—If the "Can the cockeral" week was the success it should have been about two-thirds of a million dollars has been saved to the Oregon poultry industry. U. L. Upson, Federal and O. F. A. C. poultry specialist, sums up the losses due to useless cockerals as follows: Number chickens in Oregon at time of latest census, 1,753,224; number of males—1 to each 12 hens—146,102; annual feed cost at \$3.50 per bird, \$511,357. Annual egg production in Oregon 11,907,000 dozen; discount of 1 cent per dozen for fertility, \$119,070. Total annual loss due to keeping cockerals with flocks, \$630,427. The food con-

sumed by useless and harmful cockerals would produce much better returns if fed to hens from which the males have been taken.
