The Sugar Catechism

In order that the consuming public may understand the seriousness of the sugar situation and the great importance of strictly observing the Food Administration's sugar regulations, the Federal Food Administrator has directed attention to a "catechism" recently issued from Washington, D. C., and every Oregon household should give this catechism careful consideration.

"The sugar shortage in the United States is real, not imaginary. An allotment has been made for every state, and anyone buying in excess of the proper allowance or withholding any sugar above immediate needs from the general supply is simply profiting at the expense of others. It should be sufficiently clear to everyone by now that adherence to the Food Administration's regulations is necessary for the common good of all. Anyone violating these regulations is claiming a special privilege for himself, and if the offense is detected, he is subject to the penalty provided under the Food Control Act. It is hoped the number of such persons will prove to be small, and that the Food Administration will have the loyal and united support of all Oregon families in its efforts to fairly distribute the limited supply of sugar allotted to this state each month."

The "catechism" to which Mr. Ayer directs attention is as follows:

Hoarding—What is sugar hoarding? Having on hand more than is needed for a reasonable length of time. You should not fail to return any unused balance of sugar purchased for canning purposes.

May a household have a month's supply on hand? This is not justifiable except in cases where there are no stores available for purchase, and it should be done upon advice of the Federal Food Administrator or his deputy.

What are some of the evils of hoarding? It throws the distribution system out of joint; it raises prices; it imposes a heavier burden upon those already doing their utmost; it results in waste where there are no proper facilities for storage; it discourages the honest.

What is the moral wrong of hoarding? It is selfish, cowardly, unpatriotic; it is, in effect, taking unto one's self special privileges at a time when Americans should be on the same footing, share and share alike.

Is there any punishment for hoarders? Yes. The Food Control Act provides fines of not more than \$5,000 and imprisonment for hoarding by dealers, manufacturers or householders.

Reports from manufacturers of canning supplies who have conformed to recommendations of the United States Department of Agriculture in the making of equipment indicate that the interest in home canning is increasing rapidly. There is a widespread demand for more equipment that will save labor and time in canning. It is estimated that there has been during the year a 50 per cent increase in the number of firms manufacturing home canning supplies, an average increase of 25 per cent in the quantity of equipment sold, and an increase of 300 per cent in the demand for rubbers of standard quality. Some of the department's canning instructions have been published by outside parties in 10 different languages and more than 100 business concerns have reprinted the directions for free distribution to their employees and customers.
