To the Voters

Of Polk County

During my former terms as Sheriff of Polk county, I conducted the affairs of that office with the assistance of only one deputy, except at tax collection time, when for a few weeks each year it was necessary to employ additional help. I can see no reason why a greater number should be on the county payroll at the present time. The work of the Sheriff's office is no greater now than it was four years ago, in fact, there is probably less for that officer to do.

A few years ago, the county jail occupied much of the sheriff's time and attention. As every voter knows the criminal element in Polk, as in all other counties in Oregon, has practically disappeared, and our county jail stands empty for months at a time. This releases the Sheriff's office from much extra work and attention.

The war has not added greatly to the duties of any county officer, as the capable young woman in the office of the local council of Defense attends to practically all of the correspondence, in addition to lending other aid. The war work of the Sheriff is largely executive, rather than clerical.

I can see no reason for employing more than one deputy in the Sheriff's office, except at tax collecting time, and if elected next Tuesday, I promise to conduct the office under the same conditions which now exist, with one assistant, thus saving to the taxpayers of Polk County the salary of one deputy.
