The students of Monmouth High School are now busily settling down to the work of a new semester. The first week after the opening of school was given over to examinations, so the new term begins one week later than scheduled.

Several of the members of the senior class have finished and gone into other work. Imogene Richards will attend Behnke-Walker Business College in Portland, while Laura Larsen and Mabel Crosby are attending the Normal School. Clieve Dunlop, a Freshman, is now a student at Franklin High School, Portland.

Our ranks are filled once more, however, by the return to school of Naomi Mulkey who has just returned from Tillamook, Denzel Moore, Will Harvey, and Will Crabtree, formerly of the S. A. T. C. at Corvallis.

The Chorus this semester will be under the supervision of Miss Sadie Havelly of Portland.

Since the influenza has subsided in our locality the board has removed its objections to basket ball games and the boys hope to be able to stage some interesting conflicts in the near future. It is probable that on February 22, Amity will

send both a boys' and a girls' team to Monmouth.

On Wednesday afternoon the High School received a visit from Mr. Almack of the University of Oregon Extension Department. Mr. Almack made a brief speech on the choosing of a vocation. We have had very few visitors this year and appreciate the interest shown by those who have come and have left us some message which is of permanent value now.

Howard Morlan says that in his soldier experiences he weathered two waves of the influenza without taking it himself. In the camp at Leavenworth between four and five hundred soldiers died during the one wave of the flu. One hundred and twenty died in one night. His second experience with the disease was at Camp Mead where the wave was comparatively light. Howard's specialty in the army was signal work and he learned the alphabet in three different spheres of work. This was by the sounder of the wireless instrument, by the flashing of lights and by waving of the arms. While in the east he visited New York, Philadelphia, Washington and Baltimore. His discharge papers were issued November 23

but he was not actually discharged until February, the intervening time being spent in passing the authorization down the line of sub-officers from headquarters to the final discharge clerk.

Mrs. H. E. Guthrie was called to Corvallis on February 1st on account of the serious illness of her daughter, Mrs. A. Rickard. Mrs. Rickard was removed to Portland and quarantined in a hospital by a specialist, awaiting an operation for appendicitis. Mrs. Guthrie returned to her home Tuesday afternoon. Mrs. Rickard will remain in quarantine for a week as precautionary measure against influenza, before the operation.
