Umatilla county has just voted a large bond issue to supplement the work of the highway commission. Marion county, after duly considering the question has agreed on a road program and will ask the voters to give them \$800,000 in bonds at the election in June. Linn county is chewing over the situation in that section and contemplates something on the same line. Polk county through some of its foresighted citizens, has also seen the necessity of such work and proposes action. Before definite step is taken a conference of citizens of the county should be held; for the scope of the proposal should be ample to anticipate the needs of our citizens for some time to come. It should be an all-the-county affair with all corners represented and just as the state has decided to do for its people, Polk county should do for itself. It is necessary to meet the state requirements in the doing of state work or its money will be diverted

elsewhere. At the same time the general needs of all the county should be considered, that the best advantage may be taken of the state work and that the county work shall be done so as best to develop its resources.

While the average distillery will have to be rebuilt to fit it for the production of pure alcohol, there is every reason to believe this is the direction their activities must take when the prohibition law goes into effect. The great advance which the business of America has made in the direction of gas driven machinery, bids fair to exhaust the gasoline resources of the earth, which as it gets scarcer becomes more expensive. Alcohol is the natural substitute and as it can be produced in hundreds of ways from material now going to waste, it offers a most promising field to both capital and invention. Alcohol can now be manufactured for 50 cents per gallon. With the intensive study which comes with increased production means will be found for cutting the costs until it can compete with gasoline. Sometime every up-to-date farmer will manufacture his own gas for use in tractor, truck and car and will do it from materials now thought little of and ordinarily wasted.

Church union is constantly advocated and most people admit that when it arrives we will be about ready for the millennium, although to a more or less casual inspection both seem about as far off as they well could be. However, the stress of the war should have a liberalizing effect on the creeds. The army of young men who will come back from direct contact with all sorts and conditions of men, should take up gospel work with a certain tolerance not to be found in the man who only mixes with people of his own particular beliefs.

The world is swinging along now at so fast a pace that comment on current events has to be up-to-the-minute and the periodicals and magazines whose comment has to be prepared two or three weeks in advance are apt to be put in a disconcerting light when the day of publication is reached. For one thing the public conception of the peace convention and the league of nations is constantly shifting and statements which have been made with consistency a month ago now do not fit the occasion at all.

If the highway commission had taken a ruler and drawn a north and south line anywhere in Polk county they could not have found a

place where our present road system would come as near to the line as the route adopted. It is in fact the most direct route across Polk county and this fact is bound to become apparent to the citizens of the county as they study the matter.

There are more people now in favor of educational restrictions in the granting of suffrage than there used to be; in fact there is a concerted demand for it. Time was when our appetite for an increased population was so ravenous that we were able to take and digest any old thing in the line of foreign citizenship but now the edge of that appetite is dulled considerably. We sometimes think that even for people who move from one state to another there should be some sort of catechism which the applicant should master before he is granted voting rights in the new state of his adoption in order to make an intelligent citizen thereof. If every new citizen of the state was given a copy of Prof. J. B. Horner's "Oregon" and told to master it the average intelligence of the voting population of the state would be enhanced considerably. The O. A. C. man has searched the records to find interesting and historical information about Oregon. By no means the most important is the historical part. The story of pioneer effort is always interesting and the accounts of the Indian wars as well as of the rise and fall of political heroes has a certain personal tang that commands attention; but they must hold a second place to a knowledge of the state as nature has endowed it. Prof. Horner has given full stress to this part. He describes the characteristics of the coast, the intermediate valleys and the eastern plateau, the agricultural diversities of the state, the mineral resources and its natural attractions including the caves of Josephine county, Crater lake, the Dalles of the Columbia, etc., all matters in which it is highly important that citizens of the commonwealth should be informed. We acknowledge receipt of the book with gratitude and have found much pleasure and information in reading it.

On New Year's eve the cost of the war to the United States stood at \$22,000,000,000. Practically all of this money had been raised by taxation and by the Liberty loans. The entire amount which had come into the Treasury up to that time for war purposes had either been spent or had been earmarked for specific bills.

Since the middle of November when the armistice was signed the government has been borrowing at the rate of \$600,000,000 every two weeks to meet its war obligations. At this rate it will have obtained from the banks of the nation from four to five billions of dollars before the beginning of the fifth Liberty Loan April 21.

The people of the United States, through their representatives in Congress, voted for the expenditures which made necessary the borrowing of these huge sums. The government in anticipation of patriotic support from the country in raising the Victory Liberty Loan has already paid the bills. In all justice and honesty the people of the United States will not fail their government and will finish the job by oversubscribing the last popular war loan by an even larger percentage than they did the four which have gone before.

SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, For Polk County.
R. C. Clostermann, Plaintiff vs. F. H. Pepper, and C. E. Shaw, Defendants.

To F. H. Pepper, of above named defendants:

In the Name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, within forty-five (45) days from the date of the first publication of this Summons, to-wit: on or before the 22nd day of April, 1919, that date being more than six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, and if you fail so to appear and answer said complaint, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief in the complaint demanded and prayed for, to-wit:

For a decree against defendants foreclosing that certain Chattel Mortgage made by defendants to Paul Wessinger and Henry Wagner, Trustees, recorded in Book 4, page 230, Records of Chattel Mortgages, Polk County, Oregon: For a judgment against defendants for \$3417.41, and \$300.00 attorney's fees, and interest on said sums at 6 per cent from February 21st, 1919, and for the costs and disbursements of this suit, and that execution issue therefor: That plaintiff be decreed to have a first, prior and subsisting lien upon the property described in said Chattel Mortgage, for the amounts for which judgment is prayed for and rendered against them: That the property in said Mortgage described be sold by the Sheriff of Polk County, Oregon, and the proceeds thereof be applied towards the payment of said judgment, and that if the proceeds should be insufficient to pay the same, that plaintiff have a judgment against defendants for the deficiency: That defendants be barred and foreclosed of and from all right, title and interest and equity in and to the mortgaged property, and for such other relief as to the Court may seem equitable.
