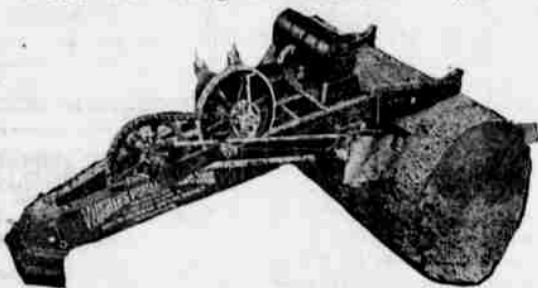

The Ostiens recently came from Madras to Monmouth in one day in their new Essex, returning from a trip to the east of the Cascades.

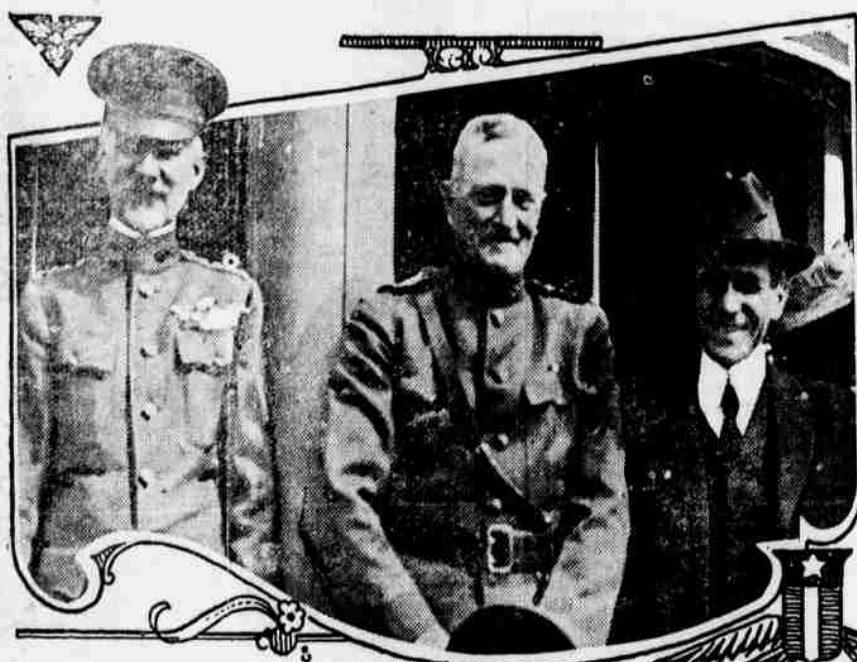
Dr. J. O. Matthias of Salem was a visitor in Monmouth Friday.
