Camermen Picture News Events of the Day



Strikes, flood and waste are the high spots of news events for the week. The flood picture is an exclusive photo of the terrible havoc wrought at Corpus Christi, Texas, when the hurricane lashed Gulf waters virtually submerged the town, resulting in heavy loss of life. Galveston, Brownsville and many other towns also suffered immense losses. The strike picture is from Gary, Ind., where steel mill workers by the thousands are out on strike. Both steel worker leaders and steel mill

owners say this will be a battle to the finish. The "waste" picture shows thousands of automobiles owned by the government, rotting and rusting out in open storage at Camp Holabird, Md., where they have been ever since the armistice was signed. Both truck and passenger cars of all standard makes are included. Congressman C. F. Reavis of Nebraska is trying to get some action in distributing them to the people.

(Note: During the first five days of the test the motor stopped twice. Once it was stalled by the driver and once it stopped because of an obstruction in the fuel pipe leading to the carburetor. But for the balance of the time, nearly 26 days, it ran without a falter.
