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such improvements, alterations or repairs, and assess upon the lot or part thereof the cost of such improvements, alterations or repairs, as provided in sections 34, 35 and 36 of this act; provided, that the common council may order all such improvements, alterations or repairs in whole or in part to be paid for out of the general funds of the city; and provided, further, that in all cases for repair of sidewalks, the council may order such repairs to be made within ten days of the service of a copy of said order, certified by the recorder, upon the owner or possessor of the adjacent lot or lots, or in case said parties are not found, then within twelve days from the date of posting said certified copy in a conspicuous place upon said lot or lots, near the repairs ordered; provided, that where the common council shall deem it expedient to the interests of the city they may at their discretion reduce the amount of time in which the owners of lots abutting on proposed improvements are allowed for doing said work but in any case time allowed shall not be less than ten days.

AN ACT

To amend an act entitled "An act to incorporate the city of Monmouth in Polk county, Oregon, and to repeal all prior acts or parts of acts to incorporate said city of Monmouth, and all amendments thereto" approved February 6, 1899, as subsequently amended by a measure submitted to and approved by the voters of said city at an election duly called and held therein on June 5, 1911, and also as subsequently amended by a measure submitted to and approved by the voters thereof at an election duly called and held in said city on November 27, 1913, and as further amended by a measure submitted to and approved by the voters of said city at an election duly called and held therein on April 30, 1917, and to amend all other amendments amending said act enacted by the Legislative Assembly or by vote of the people.

Be it Enacted by the People of the City of Monmouth that an act entitled "An act to incorporate the city of Monmouth in Polk county, Oregon, and to repeal all prior acts or parts of acts to incorporate said city of Monmouth, and all amendments thereto" approved February 6, 1899, as subsequently amended by a measure submitted to and approved by the voters of said city at an election duly called and held on June 5, 1911, and also as subsequently amended by a measure submitted to and approved by the voters at an election duly called and held in said city on November 27, 1913, and as further amended by a measure submitted to and approved by the voters of said city at an election duly called and held therein on April 30, 1917, and to amend all other amendments amending said act enacted by the Legislative Assembly or by vote of the people be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto Sections 54 and 55 to read as follows:

Whenever an assessment has been made against property benefitted, for any improvement of any character mentioned in this charter, and the proceedings of any portion thereof, whereby such assessment has been made, shall be declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, because of any defect, jurisdictional or otherwise, or of any irregularity or informality, the City of Monmouth may within one year from the date of the entry of such judgment or decree declaring the same invalid or defective, maintain

an action in the Circuit court of the state of Oregon for Polk county, against the owners of the lots or lot, block or blocks, parcel or parcels of land upon which the costs of such improvement or repair of any street, avenue, lane or alley, sewer or drain, should be imposed under the terms of this act, and recover the proportion of the costs of such construction, improvement or repair to any street, avenue, alley, sewer or drain, properly chargeable under this act to each of said lots or blocks or parcels of land, including reasonable attorney's fees or maintaining the same.

Section 55. In any such action, so instituted, all persons whose property is or would be so liable for the payment of such proportion of the assessment aforesaid may be joined as part defendants in one action and the judgment rendered therein shall be a several judgment against each of said defendants for his proportion of such assessments and costs and disbursements including reasonable attorney's fees and a lien therefor shall be decreed upon the premises liable or assessed for such improvements, drain or sewer, and the general laws of Oregon governing actions at law and service of summons shall apply in such action.
