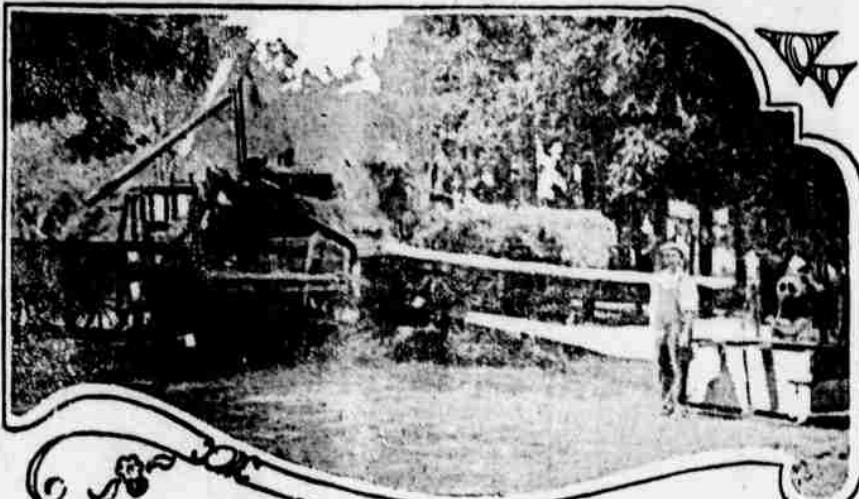




Thresh With Electric Motor for 10 Cents a Load



Electrified threshing has been added to the list of agricultural feats. On the farm of James P. Allison, near State Center, Ia., the electric motor furnished power to thresh 25 acres of heavy wheat. It took five hours to do the job, at a cost of about 50 cents an hour, or about 10 cents per load of wheat. The motor is fastened on a portable truck and is used to furnish power for thresher, silo filler, feed grinding, etc. The farmers living along electric lines running out from the municipal plant at State Center use the 50 H. P. motor. Allison says it furnishes better power, is cheaper and more convenient.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE MENTIONED IN BIBLE

"I commend unto you Phoebe, our sister, who is a servant of the Church which is at Cenchrea," wrote St. Paul to the Romans, "that ye assist her in whatsoever business she hath need of you, for she hath been a succorer of many and of myself also."

Phoebe, explains Biblical history, was a woman who went about nursing the sick and teaching them better methods of living. Phoebe was the first public health nurse.

Public health nursing, which is one of the most important enterprises in the peace program of the American Red Cross, is not a new movement, but it is one which heretofore has never received its just need of attention as a factor in maintaining the health of the nation.

Phoebe's sister in the twentieth century is the community nurse who teaches better, cleaner living. Because the betterment of public health is now

definitely accepted as an individual and a community responsibility, the Red Cross will make a definite effort to raise the standards of living in the United States by urging the employment of public health nurses in all cities, towns and rural districts, particularly in those where there are no organized public health activities. A healthier, happier America—that is what the Red Cross is striving toward in its Roll Call the first weeks in November.
