Walter McClure is visiting with his grandmother, Mrs. S. Hager.

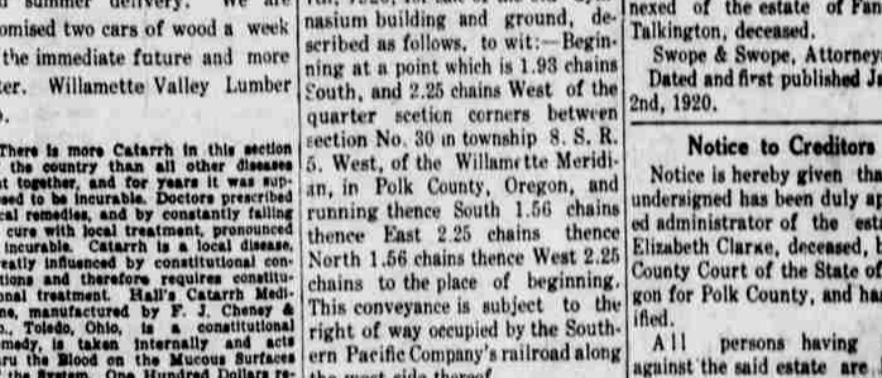
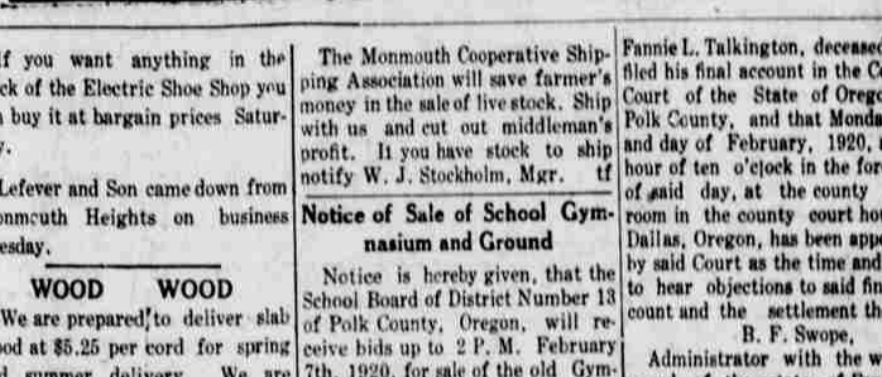
