OLD-FASHIONED DISHES DEAR TO OUR HEARTS.

How very rarely do we see the toothsome crullers, dainty, sugary, rich and crisp. The same recipe may be used for fried cakes, but the manner of cutting the cruller makes them so much more attractive. Rolled twice as thick as pastry, then cut in oblongs with three or four slits cut nearly through to the edge with a sharp knife they look like an old-fashioned barred gate before they are fried. Drop into deep hot fat and fry a golden brown; roll in powdered sugar before serving. Some cooks twist the little strips before dropping into the fat, which gives them an especially attractive appearance.

Crullers.—Take one cupful of sugar, two eggs, three tablespoonfuls of butter, one cupful of sweet milk, a teaspoonful of cream of tartar, one-half teaspoonful of soda, some grated nutmeg and a bit of salt. Cream the butter, add the sugar and when well mixed the yolks of the eggs well beaten, then a little of the milk with flour sifted with the dry ingredients and fold in the stiffly beaten whites. Use just as little flour as possible to roll. Chill on ice before rolling and the cakes can be handled very soft.

Sour Cream Doughnuts.—Beat two eggs until light and foamy, add one and three-fourths cupfuls of sugar and continue beating until the sugar is nearly dissolved; add one and one-fourth cupfuls of sour milk, one-fourth of a cupful of thick, sour cream, a teaspoonful of soda, a half teaspoonful of salt and grated nutmeg to flavor. Add as little flour as possible to handle; set on ice an hour to harden before rolling. Fry in hot fat, using the one-minute test. (A cube of bread browned in one minute in the fat.)

Dumplings.—Delicious fluffy dumplings may be prepared as follows: Take one beaten egg, one cupful of butter milk, not too sour, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder and half a teaspoonful of salt sifted in flour enough to make about a cupful and a half of drop batter. Drop from a teaspoon into a boiling hot kettle of meat with

plenty of bones on which to rest the dumplings. Cook eight minutes. Do not uncover during the cooking.

How to Retrieve Stamp.

Most people do not know that an unused postage stamp which has been attached to a letter that it is decided, later, not to mail, can be very easily separated from the envelope it cleaves to—without the troublesome soaking in water that takes time when one wants to use the stamp in a hurry. And most people do want a stamp in a hurry.

The trick is simple enough: Simply tear the envelope from the stamp instead of trying to wrest the stamp from the envelope. Cut the envelope away from the stamp, leaving just a margin of paper for thumb and finger to grasp; then with the stamp turned away from you and the paper toward you, begin to peel away the paper at one corner of the stamp, then another, then another. Presently the paper will be loose at all the edges and a little care will get it quite off the stamp at the center. Try this, next time you want to use an already pasted down postage stamp and see how easy it is!

How to Clean Tarnished Silver. Silver is readily tarnished by sulphur, either from eggs, or from rubber bands or elastic, or sometimes from the sulphur compounds in the illuminating gas. The sulphur of silver thus formed is in color from grayish to black. Silver thus tarnished should be rubbed with moist common salt before washing, thus forming a chloride of silver, which may then be washed in ammonia, in which it is soluble.

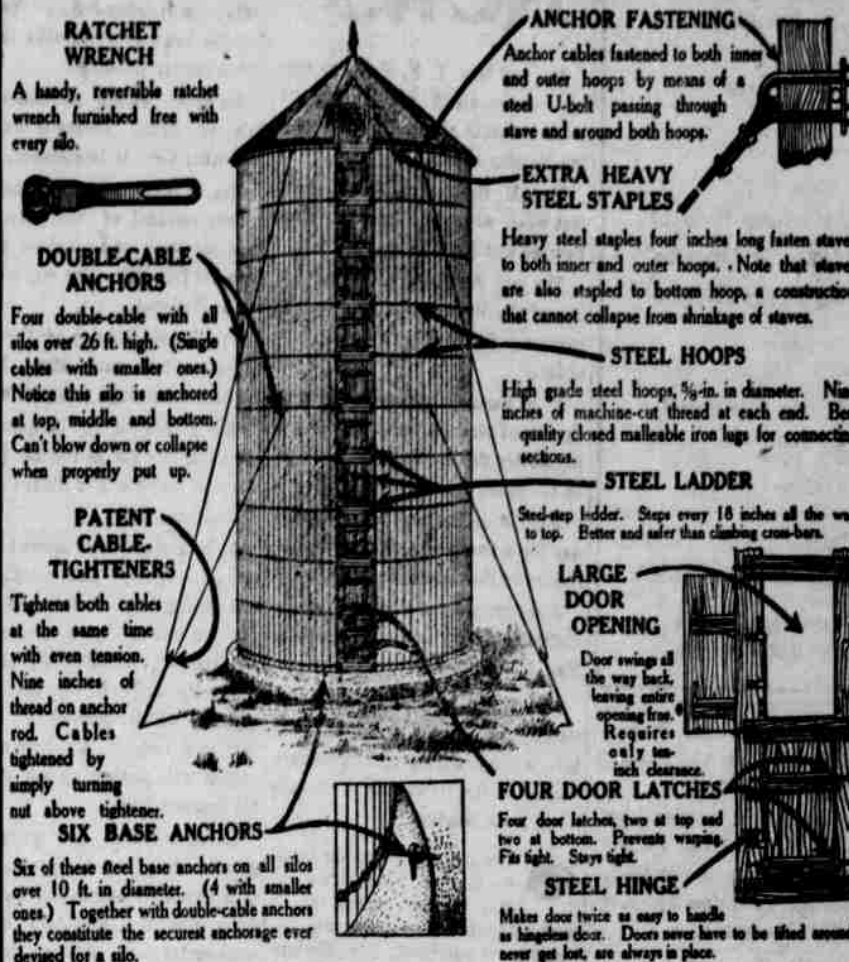
PROPER CARE FOR GOSLINGS

As Young Fowls Grow Older They Consume Considerable Grass and Other Green Stuff.

The brooding and feeding of goslings is not much different from that of ducklings except as the goslings grow older they consume considerable grass and other growing green material and in that way cut down their feed bill. They can be allowed free range when they are two weeks old. Goslings are seldom brooded artificially but will do well with mother geese, hens or even ducks.

In other words, you pay "extras" for necessary conveniences without which your silo is incomplete.

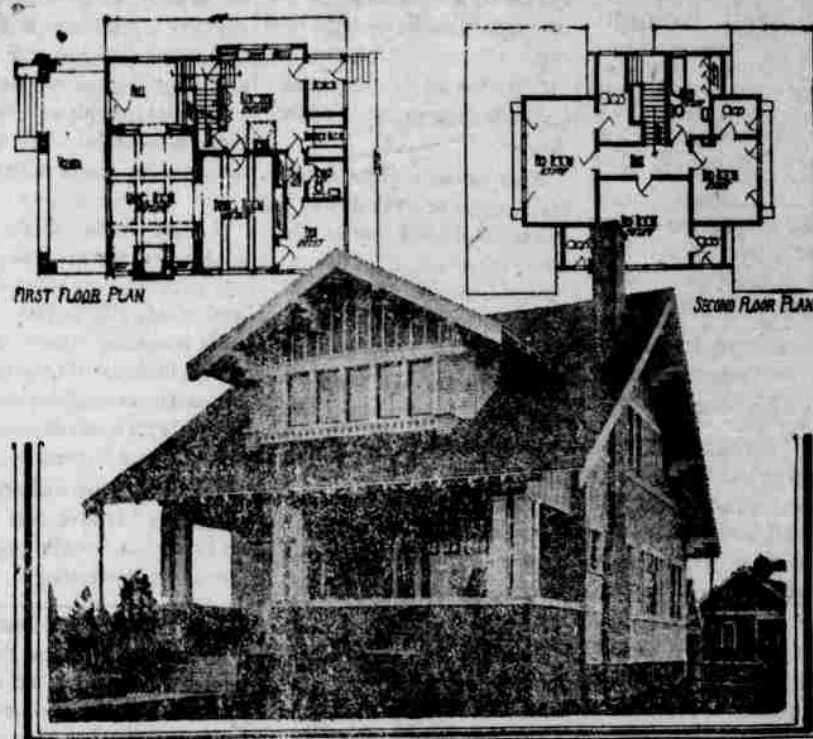
