Biscuits

8 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking
Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons shortening
1 cup milk or half milk and
half water

Sift together flour, baking pow-
der and salt, add shortening and
rub in very lightly; add liquid
slowly; roll or pat on floured
board to about one inch in
thickness (handle as little as
possible); cut with biscuit cutter.
Bake in hot oven 15 to 20 min-
utes.

Royal Cinnamon Buns

2 1/2 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons Royal Baking
Powder
3 tablespoons shortening
1 egg
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup sugar
2 teaspoons cinnamon
4 tablespoons seeded raisins

Sift 2 tablespoons of measured
sugar with flour, salt and bak-
ing powder; rub shortening in
lightly; add beaten egg to water
and add slowly. Roll out 1/4 inch

thick on floured board; brush
with melted butter, sprinkle with
sugar, cinnamon and raisins.
Roll as for jelly roll; cut into
1 1/2 inch pieces; place with cut
edges up on well-greased pan;
sprinkle with a little sugar and
cinnamon. Bake in moderate
oven 30 to 35 minutes; remove
from pan at once.

Parker House Rolls

4 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
8 teaspoons Royal Baking
Powder
3 tablespoons shortening
1 1/2 cups milk

Sift flour, salt and baking pow-
der together. Add melted short-
ening to milk and add slowly to
dry ingredients stirring until
smooth. Knead lightly on floured
board and roll out 1/4 inch thick.
Cut with biscuit cutter. Crease
each circle with back of knife
one side of center. Butter the
small section and fold larger
part well over the small. Place
one inch apart in greased pan.
Allow to stand 15 minutes in
warm place. Brush each with
melted butter and bake in mode-
rate oven 15 to 20 minutes.
