

CITY MARSHAL'S NOTICE OF SALE OF REAL PROPERTY FOR DELINQUENT STREET ASSESSMENTS.

Notice is hereby given that the Recorder of the City of Monmouth, Oregon, has placed in my hands a warrant for the collection of the delinquent street assessments for the improvement of Main street from the East line of Broad street West to the West line of Monmouth Avenue, by grading the same to sub-grade, paving a 40 foot road way thereon along and upon the center of said Main street, with a concrete base 5 inches thick and an Asphaltic Top Wearing surface 2 inches thick, and concrete curb lines thereon, and abutting upon the herein-after described real property, which assessment amounts to the sum of \$338.80, and the cost of entering the same in the lien docket of said city is \$5.00, and said recorder has transmitted to me a list of said delinquent street assessments: Now, therefore, pursuant to said warrant, the charter, ordinances and resolutions of the city of Monmouth, Oregon, I will on the 9th day of October, 1920, at the hour of one o'clock in the afternoon of said day, at the front door of the city hall of said city (the same being the building in which the Common Council holds its sessions), offer for sale at public auction to the highest bidder for cash in hand, subject to redemption, the following described premises, to-wit:

W. corner of lot 7 in Block 8 in the City of Monmouth, Polk County, Oregon, running thence East 110 feet; thence North 142 1/2 feet; thence East 55 feet to the East line of lot 8; thence North 22 1/2 feet; thence West 165 feet to the West line of lot 7; thence South 165 feet to the place of beginning, owned by Martha Lenora Chapman, and assessed to the said Martha Lenora Chapman in the sum of \$338.80, interest and cost to date hereof \$86.21, cost of advertising \$15.00 and that said tract or parcel of land will then and there be offered for sale and sold at public auction for cash in hand to the highest bidder therefor, to satisfy said assessment, interest and costs due upon the same as aforesaid.

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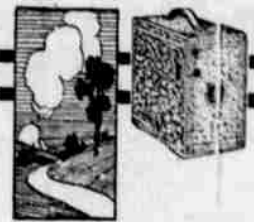

C. E. Herren has finished picking his hops and his force is now at work on Damon's five acre tract. The combined yield is being dried in Mr. Herren's drier, south east of town.

Miss Mary Jackson who teaches at Baker, is a visitor this week with her sister, Mrs. Ira C. Powell. She has spent her summer vacation in Saskatchewan.

Unless the county court of Wasco county obtains within a reasonable time rights of way for approximately one mile of road necessary to connect up the Columbia river highway with the state bridge across the Deschutes river, J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway department, will institute legal proceedings to condemn the land necessary for the success of the project. This announcement was made by Mr. Devers following a conference with members of the state highway commission in Portland.

Thousands of fine chinook salmon are going to waste in Rogue river because of the inability of the two canneries to handle the offerings. The fish are coming in such schools that the boats stay out but a short time when they pull up their nets and have more than the limit placed upon the deliveries. Several limits were made—first, as to fish, and, later, to pounds—as the fishermen threw away the small ones and delivered the larger fish, since it meant 12 cents for every pound. The last limit was made 800 pounds. The canneries are running short of cans.

Enormous quantities of dead crabs are being washed up by the tide on the mud flats at Bandon, at the mouth of the Coquille river. It is supposed that the crabs were killed by the blasting which the government engineers are doing in the river. Rock in the channel on the bar is being blasted out and the concussion has probably caused the death of the crabs.

That road construction work in Oregon will be retarded in case the increase of 25 per cent in freight charges is allowed to apply to the transportation of road building material, based on the present tariff for these commodities, was the charge made by the state highway commission in a petition asking for an immediate revision of rates on cement, asphalt and other kindred materials.

A series of meetings of the executive committee of the Cattle and Horse Raisers association of Oregon will be held in Eastern and Southern Oregon towns from September 3 to 12 as follows: Canyon City, September 3; Burns, September 4; Lakeview, September 5; Klamath Falls, September 6; Fort Klamath, September 7; Medford, September 8; Bend.
