

CITY MARSHAL'S NOTICE OF SALE OF REAL PROPERTY FOR DELINQUENT STREET ASSESSMENTS.

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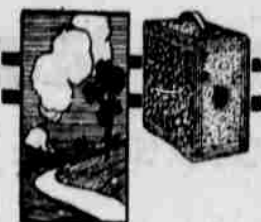
