Notice of Annual School Meeting

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 13 of Polk County, State of Oregon, that a School Meeting of said District will be held at the High School Building on the 27th day of November, 1920, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax. The total amount of money needed by the district during the fiscal year beginning on June 30, 1920, and ending on June 30, 1921, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district.

Another Royal Suggestion

PIES and PASTRIES

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

THERE is no further reason for worrying about table variety. The New Royal Cook Book gives new suggestions for every meal every day. The book is so full of surprises there should never be another dull meal in the home.

Custard Pie

1 cup pastry flour
1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
cold water

Sift flour, baking powder and salt; add one-half shortening and rub in lightly with fingers; add water slowly until of right consistency to roll out. Roll out very thin; put on in small pieces remaining shortening; fold upper and lower edges in to center; fold sides in to center again; roll out thin and put on pie plate.

Custard

3 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups scalded milk
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Beat eggs, add sugar, salt, flavoring and milk very slowly. Line pie plate with paste made as above, and bake in very hot oven about 10 minutes. Pour custard into the baked crust and bake in moderate oven about 25 minutes. The pie is done when a knife put in center of custard comes out dry.

Cocoanut Pie is made the same way, adding 1 cup of shredded cocoanut, and using only 2 eggs.
