Biscuits and Cinnamon Buns

Biscuits
 2 cups flour
 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 4 tablespoons shortening
 1 cup milk or half milk and half water

Mix together flour, baking powder and salt, add shortening and rub in very lightly; add liquid slowly; roll or pat on floured board to about one inch in thickness (handle as little as possible); cut with biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven 15 to 20 minutes.

Royal Cinnamon Buns
 2 1/2 cups flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
 2 tablespoons shortening
 1 cup water
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 1 tablespoon seeded raisins

Mix 1/2 tablespoons of measured sugar with flour, salt and baking powder; rub shortening in lightly; add beaten egg to water and add slowly. Roll out 1/4-inch thick on floured board; brush with melted butter; sprinkle with sugar, cinnamon and raisins. Roll as for jelly roll; cut into 1 1/2-inch pieces; place with cut edges up on well-greased pan; sprinkle with a little sugar and cinnamon. Bake in moderate oven 30 to 35 minutes; remove from pan at once.
