Mrs. Anne Elizabeth Campbell, more affectionately known to the older residents of Dallas and Polk county as "Aunt Betty," died at the family home in Dallas at the age of 76.

Sheep entered the Hampton school house in Deschutes county and devoured the school register containing the records of every pupil attending the school since the district was organized in 1911.

The trustees of Albany college have been notified of a bequest left the college by the late Ellen E. Geary of Portland. Miss Geary was a daughter of one of the early presidents of the institution.

Out of a total of \$25,903,851.92 that has been expended by the highway department from its inception in 1913 to December 1 of this year, more than half, or \$13,344,398.37 has been expended this year.

Application for permit to appropriate water has been filed in the office of the state engineer by M. F. Hanley of Medford, covering appropriation of water from the north fork of Little Butte creek for irrigation of 780 acres in Jackson county. It is estimated that the development will cost approximately \$44,000 and will consist of a power plant.

Measures having for their purpose the regulation of interstate traffic as it relates to the operation of motor vehicles and uniform laws for all the northwest states will be submitted to the legislatures of Washington, California, Oregon and Idaho, in case of officials in charge of the automobile departments of these states comply with the request of Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, who in a letter issued Saturday urged a conference at an early date to decide upon regulations needed in handling the traffic situation.

Secretary of the Interior Payne advised Representative Sinnott Friday that some change will be made in the contract with the California-Oregon Power company for the construction of the Link-river dam at the outlet of Upper Klamath lake. A clarifying provision will be inserted, making clear the paramount right of the government to the water. In addition, the secretary of the Interior has decided to approve the Sinnott bill which would permit the organization of a drainage district under the Oregon

state law for the purpose of dyking several thousand acres of marsh lands in the same locality.
