Notice of Appointment of Viewers

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Monmouth, Oregon, did, on the 20th day of September, 1921, duly appoint J. L. Murdock, J. S. Fuller and G. T. Boothby, three disinterested freeholders of the city of Monmouth, as Viewers to make an assessment of the damages and benefits to the premises over which the proposed new street, to be known and designated as "Highway" street, and to determine how much less valuable, if any, the lands and premises over which the same is to be laid out and established will be rendered by reason of the establishment of said new street, and for that purpose said viewers will meet on Saturday the 22nd day of October, 1921, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon of said day, and for such other duties as may devolve upon them as said viewers: That the following is the description of said proposed street as the same will be established and laid out on the premises of A. & C. M. Parker in Lot 2 Bentley Addition to the city of Monmouth, Polk county, Oregon, to-wit:—All that part of the property of A. & C. M. Parker in said lot No. 2, and lot 6, Block 16 in said city of Monmouth, included within a strip of land 60 feet wide, being 30 feet on each side of the center line of "Highway Street" as sur-

vayed and laid out over and across said property, which is more particularly described as follows—

Beginning at the point where a line parallel to the center line of the said street and 30 feet distant therefrom, measured Easterly at right angles, intersects the North boundary of said lot 2, which is also the South boundary of said block 16, said point being distant 173.5 feet more or less, measured Easterly from the Northwest corner of said lot 2, and 19 feet more or less, measured Westerly from the Southeast corner of said lot 6;

Thence Westerly along the said South boundary of said Block 16, a distance of 63.5 feet more or less to the middle point of the South boundary of said lot 6 in said block 16;

Thence Northerly along the East boundary of the West half of said lot 6 in said Block 16, 7.1 feet more or less, to a line parallel to the center line of said highway and 30 feet distant therefrom, measured Westerly at right angles;

Thence South 27 degrees 50 min., W. parallel to the center line of said highway, a distance of 243 feet, more or less, to the West boundary of said lot 2; which is also the east line of a road or street;

Thence Southerly along the said West boundary of said lot 2, a distance of 129.3 feet, more or less, to the S. W. corner of said lot 2.

Thence Easterly along the South boundary of said lot 2, which is also the North line of a road or street, a distance of 14.6 feet, more or less, to a line parallel to the center line of the said Highway Street and 30 feet distant therefrom, measured Easterly along the radius of a curve in the said center line;

Thence Northeasterly along a curve of 447.5 feet radius, to the right, parallel to the center line of the said proposed street or highway, a distance of 102.5 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning of the said curve;

Thence North 27 deg. 50 min. East, parallel to the center line of the said street, a distance of 272.1 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning; and containing 0.436 of one acre, more or less.

Also, all that part of the property of the Lucy Foster-Leonard estate in lots 1, 6, and 7 in Block 16 in the city of Monmouth, Polk county, Oregon, included within a strip of land 60 feet wide, being 30 feet on each side of the center line of the proposed "Highway Street", as surveyed over and across said property which is more particularly described as follows, to-wit—

Thence Southwesterly along a curve of 447.5 feet radius, to the right, parallel to the center line of said Highway street, a distance of 153.8 feet, more or less, to the end of the said curve;

Thence South 27 deg. 50 min. W., a distance of 88.1 feet, more or less, parallel to the center line of said proposed Highway street, to the West boundary of the East half of said lot 6 in said block 16;

Thence Southerly along the said West boundary of the East half of said lot 6 in said block 16, seven and one tenth feet, more or less to the South boundary of said lot 6;

Thence Easterly along said South boundary of said lot 6, in said block 16, 63.5 feet, more or less, to a line parallel to the center line of said Highway street and 30 feet distant therefrom, measured Easterly at right angles, to the point of beginning, being 19 feet distant, measured Westerly more or less, from the S. E. corner of said lot 6;

Thence North 27 deg. 50 min. E, a distance of 43 feet, more or less, parallel to the center line of said Highway street, to the East boundary of said lot 6 in block 16;

Thence northerly along the east boundary of said block 16 which is also the West line of Knox street, a distance of 194.3 feet more or less, to the point of beginning, and containing 0.177 of one acre, more or less.
