POULTRY NOTES

Sow a patch of rye near the poultry house. It will make fine forage this winter when all other green things are dead.

Eggs that are gathered often, kept cool, and are candled and graded bring better prices at the market than the "just eggs" kind.

The element of luck doesn't enter into the poultry business more largely than into any other. Ability and persistency are what count.

Scabby or scaly legs can be cured by applying a mixture of lard and kerosene twice a week for a month. Rub well in among the scales.

The poorest sandy soil is best for poultry because such land usually dries off rapidly and hence gapes, rheumatism and other germ diseases seldom appear.

Keep the poultry, as well as all other living things on the farm, on good terms with you by keeping on good terms with them.

There is mighty little money in fowls that are always kept hungry, but there is also a difference between well-fed and overfed hens.

Don't try to see how many fowls you can keep, but how well you can keep them. Don't overcrowd your houses or yards; crowding is dangerous.

ESTIMATED 1921 APPLE CROP
Commercial Output Placed at 18,000,000 Barrels Compared With 36,000,000 Year Ago.

Federal estimate put the apple crop this year at 108,000,000 bushels as compared with 240,000,000 bushels last year and a five-year average of 103,000,000 bushels. The commercial crop for the country is estimated at 18,000,000 barrels compared with 36,000,000 barrels last year.

Prune Pear Trees Regularly.
Pear trees should be given rather regular pruning and some of the very old trees, which have huge clusters of weak spurs, can be rejuvenated rapidly by spur thinning, thinning out one-fourth to one-third of the spurs.

First-Class Fruit.
The fruit that brings the top price is first-class fruit that reaches the market in as good condition as it leaves the orchard and that is packed in a neat and attractive manner.

For Oil Stains.
To remove obstinate oil stains mix well three ounces of spirits of turpentine and one ounce of essence of lemon and apply as you would any other scouring substance.

VOYAGERS OF LIFE.

THE captain who can first find his bearings in the snarling storm at sea, is he who will be first to reach a safe harbor.

THE ROMANCE OF WORDS

"PICNIC."

DURING the early years of the past century it was customary for those who were invited to an outdoor entertainment to bring their own refreshments with them. A list of what was considered necessary would be made out and passed around among the guests, and each person would agree to furnish a certain portion of the repast, the name of each article being then crossed, or ticked, off the list. For this reason, this form of what the French refer to as fete champagne became known as a "pick-and-nick," referring to the selection or picking of the various articles and the crossing them off upon the card, and, through the usual contraction, the central word was dropped and the term shortened to "picnic."

Though this word does not appear to have been used prior to 1802, outdoor entertainments of this nature were common during the two centuries which preceded. Mainwaring, in a letter dated November 22, 1618, describes a birthday party for the prince of Wales, at which "every man did bring his dish of meat." "Sir George Young's invention," adds the writer, "was four huge brawny pigs, piping hot and harnessed with ropes of sausages, all tied in a monstrous bag pudding."
