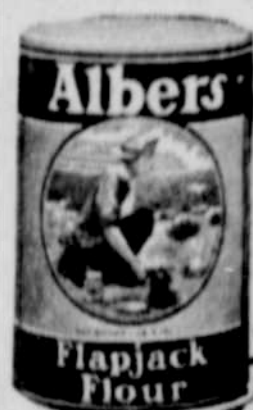
Prof. Homer Dodds, Mrs. Deane
