To The Voters of Polk County:

You are no doubt aware that the primary nominating election will soon be here and you will be called upon to take part in the nomination of a candidate for the office of county commissioner. By reason of the fact that I am an avowed candidate for such nomination, but feel that shall I be unable to meet all of you face to face and have a heart to heart talk with you in support of my candidacy, I will now proceed to tell you a few things that may help you in reaching a conclusion in this matter.

I came to Dallas, Polk County, Oregon in 1910, and during the following five years was employed by the City of Dallas in the capacity of foreman of its rock quarry. Since 1915 I have been engaged in general farming near Buell, Oregon, earning a livelihood for my family and myself by the sweat of my brow.

So far as I am aware, my political

opponents have not attacked my honesty or integrity, nor have they questioned my competency to discharge the duties of the office to which I aspire. But their strong argument, as they view it, is that I am a resident of the northern part of the county. This appears to me to be a very lame argument. Do any of you voters know of any candidate who has been nominated and elected president of the United States, having been a resident of a state west of the Mississippi river at the time of his nomination and election? Yet you do not hear the voters of the different states clamoring for the nomination of a favorite son of their respective state in order that their local interests may be taken care of. Nor is it necessary that the two commissioners of Polk County should be residents of widely different sections of the county, for the representative citizens of any part of our county should and will have influence enough upon any honest and conscientious county court to receive from its hands just an meritorious treatment for their respective localities. And if nominated and elected to the office of county commissioner, it shall be my honest and conscientious effort and desire to treat all parts of our county fairly, justly and impartially.

I believe that public taxes should be reduced, instead of being increased; and I firmly believe this can be done by a more judicious and economical expenditure of public money, i. e., by getting value received for every dollar of money spent.

I am a firm believer in good roads and good schools, because I believe they are part and parcel of the foundation upon which good government is built; but the taxpayers are entitled to, and should receive, value received for each and every dollar spent in support of such institutions. And furthermore, I believe that the maintenance and preservation of our public highways should be carefully and wisely safeguarded in proportion to their cost to the taxpayers.

I am not affiliated with any political clique or clan, nor have I a campaign manager. If nominated and elected to the office of county commissioner, I will be free to act according to the dictates of my conscience and my judgment in all matters pertaining to the discharge of the duties of such office.
