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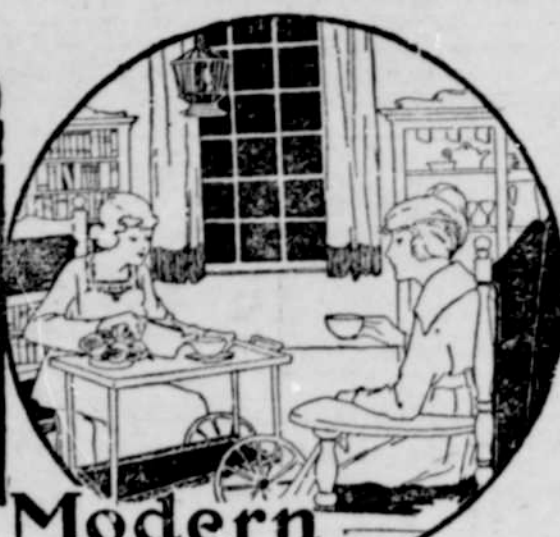

Meditations

Probably there are a few of our older readers who remember the "Arkansas Traveler". It flourished in the days when people depended on Texas Siftings, the Danbury News, the Detroit Free Press, Puck and Judge for their humorous reading. Clippings from the Arkansas Traveler were frequently to be met with in reading. For the most part they dealt with eccentric characters from the mountains and plains of what during the civil war were known as the "border states". The man who was partial to a "middlin' of meat". The newspaper man who had a nigger run off his weekly edition but could not do so until he has raised enough cash to get his paper out of a heartless express office, the man who sat in the shade of the corn crib and followed the shade around while he played on a dilapidated flute. These are only a few of the characters dug up and made famous by Opie Read in the Arkansas Traveler and later in a series of novels. He never reached the Olympian heights as a philosopher but as a delineator of eccentric types of character he held the field to himself.

The writer of these columns acknowledges many pleasant hours spent with Mr. Read's writings and it was like listening to an old friend to hear him on the Chautauqua platform as was the case last week in Dallas. As a lecturer he is fully as good as he is as a writer and although getting along in years entertains new thousands each year.

The patronage of the city water system has increased materially during the past two years. There are now over two hundred patrons. One hundred and ten are paying for the sprinkling privilege. Before the Teal creek water system was put in we were getting along with 25 gallons of water a minute and even less than that. Of course a six inch pipe multiplies that quantity several times but we are beginning to realize that with over a hundred hose connections busy and in the heated spell when shower baths are in demand, even a six inch pipe has its limitations. During nine months of the year it is more than sufficient but during the summer it is imperative that the supply be subject to regulations.

Possibly as inexpensive a way as any to increase the summer supply would be to put in a reservoir or lake at the top of the first divide to the west. There are two elevation heights on the line. One near the Antioch school and the other on the west end of the Riddell farm. If a big reservoir was put in at the latter place it could be filled with the winter and spring extra supply and then be used to swell and speed up the amount for summer use.

PRESIDENT ORDERS PROPERTY RETURNED

Washington, D. C.—President Harding, by executive order, directed Allen Property Custodian Thomas W. Miller to seize the Chemical Foundation.

The order directs the return to the alien property custodian of all holdings of the Chemical Foundation, of which Francis P. Garvan, former alien property custodian, is president and has been since its organization.

The transfer of valuable patents, trademarks, copyrights, contracts, etc., was made by Garvan, as custodian, to himself, as president, with the approval of A. Mitchell Palmer, at the time Attorney General Palmer was custodian when these properties were originally seized from their alien owners as a war precaution.

The president's move is said to be the first step in extensive prosecution proceedings forecast a week ago. It follows a comprehensive official investigation made by Attorney General Daugherty.

NON-PARTISANS WIN, LOSE

League Gets Senate Choice But Fails to Nominate Governor.

Washington, D. C.—The outcome of the republican primary in North Dakota appears to be a victory for the non-partisan league in naming the republican candidate for senator, former governor Lynn J. Frazier, to succeed Senator McCumber, but a defeat for the league in the effort to regain complete control of the state government.

Frazier, who was recalled from the governorship of North Dakota last year, is known as a radical, but in the senate he is likely to prove much less radical than he is painted, as has been the case of Dr. Ladd, the first senator put over by the non-partisan league.

The nomination of Governor Nestos means a rebuff for the non-partisan league as to its state program and the continuation of the middle of the road policy inaugurated by the new governor when he succeeded Frazier last fall.

Interest on Debt May Be Deferred.

Washington, D. C.—The American debt funding commission expects that interest payments by foreign debtor nations, with the possible exception of Great Britain, will be deferred for a number of years, it was indicated at the treasury.

2000 Portland Men Join Strike.

Portland, Or.—Approximately 2000 railroad shopmen laid down their tools in Portland in response to the national strike order in protest against the federal railroad labor board's rulings on their grievances.
