The two Oregon institutions by this action, taken as a means of reducing the burden of state taxation, puts the two Oregon institutions on a par with the state universities of Washington and California in respect to non-resident tuition. In each of the neighboring states the differential between the charges paid by the residents and those paid by students from outside the state is equal to the \$105 to be charged in Oregon. Graduate students in both institutions will be exempt under the new fee. The committee of regents emphasizes that the increased fee is not retroactive, any non-resident who has entered the university or the college under the present fee of \$60 a year ill be permitted to finish his course at that rate. To put the fees where they would be prohibitive and at the same time would be on an even basis with other states. so that the flow of non-resident students would neither be entirely cut off nor become a flood which would tax the institutions' facilities was the aim of the committee.

Members of the joint committee considering fees were J. K. Weatherford of Albany, chairman; Walter M. Pierce of La Grande, and President W. J. Kerr from the college and Judge J. W. Hamilton of Roseburg, chairman; C,. E. Woodson of Heppner, W. S. Gilbert of Astoria. and President P. L. Campbell from the university.
