Miss Enschede and Mr. Denman went to Salem Tuesday to hear Alberto Salvi the world's greatest harpist.

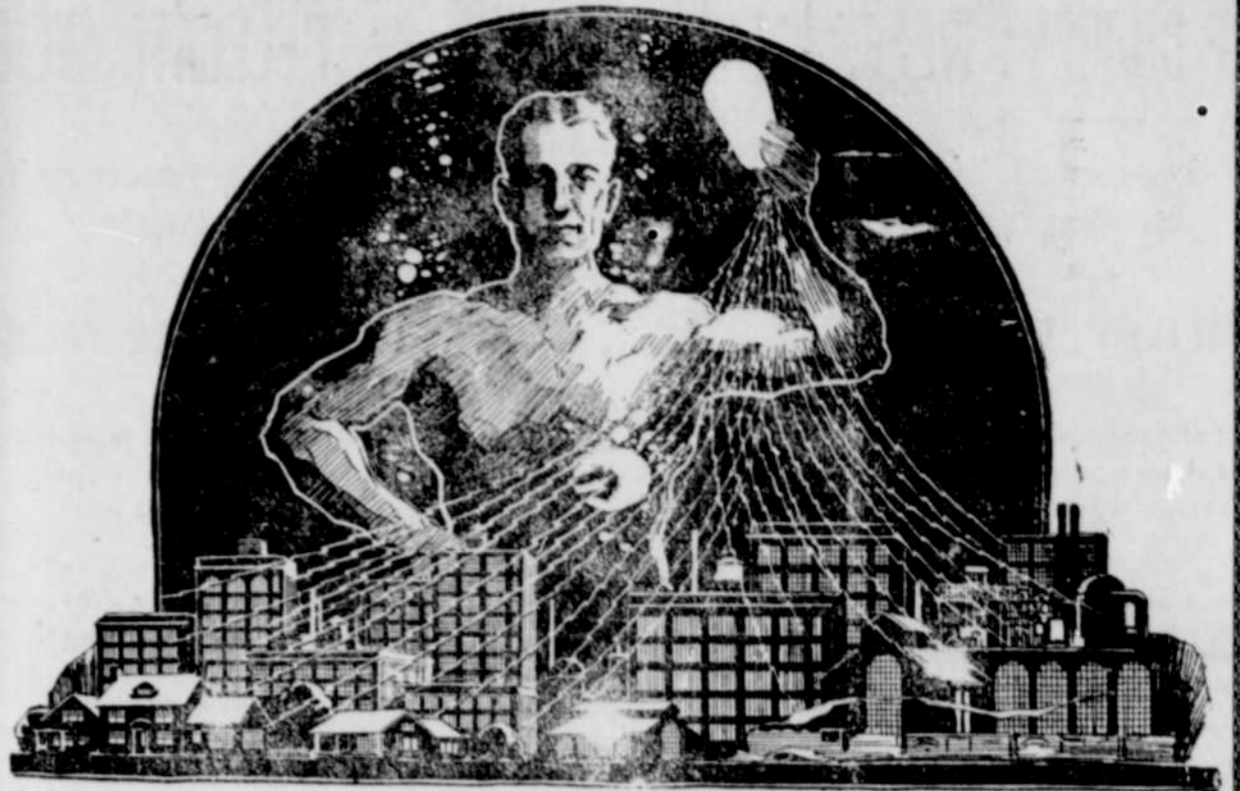
## AIRLIE
