## DEAD NORMAL GIRL WAS LONG AFFLICTED

Mona Frances Holt whose untimely end is chronicled in the Normal notes of this issue was born in Salem, June 23, 1905 and her girlhood was spent in that city. Her parents moved to Portland and now reside at Jennings

Lodge. Mona graduated with honors from the Washington high school in Portland. Since childhood she was afflicted with heart trouble and could not stand any degree of excitement. Her parents were afraid the effect of going away from home to school would be bad for her but she came to live with her cousins, the Putnams, and felt she could risk it. There was nothing in the Literary society program which she attended that evening to cause any unusual stress of mind.

Local doctors who attended her case were uncertain as to the causes of

death and it was planned to hold an inquest and perhaps an autopsy. But when the young woman's parents arrived and described her previous troubles, no further inquiry was considered necessary. Her ailment is technically known as mitral regurgitation.

Funeral services were held Monday in Salem with Dr. H. C. Dunsmore officiating. The active pall bearers were former boy school mates and six girl school mates were honorary bearers. Burial was in the Salem I. O. O. F. cemetery. Beside her parents she is survived by a sister, Thelma, and a brother, William James.
