DALLAS CUTS COST OF IMPROVING STREETS

The operation of the new plant will cut the price the city has been paying for gravel to one-third, which means that the city can do three times the amount of street work it has been doing for the same amount of money.

It is expected that the plant will be self-supporting as the amount of gravel that will be sold to points outside will more than finance the overhead expenses.
