A writer in the New York Sun exposes some of the loop holes through which the prohibition law is violated. First through permits for the use of liquor as a medicine which turns city drug stores into saloons. The second is through the use of wine for sacramental purposes which, strange as it may seem appears to be a most important way in which the law is violated. The violations are especially numerous among the Jews where many rabbis do a flourishing business with congregations in which many Gentiles are included. A few of the better class of rabbis denounce this business strongly but among the denizens of the East Side there are no such scruples. There is no head to the Jewish church, no chief rabbi. Any ten Jews may form themselves into a congregation, elect a rabbi and they have the same privileges as the regular priesthood as far as the prohibition law is concerned.

Says the writer, "What holds the traffic within bounds is the fact that canon law restricts the bootlegging of even the most daring rabbis to wine. If they could also boost Scotch the business would grow to colossal proportions."

Another fact that makes enforcement of the prohibition law difficult is the provision in the Volstead Act that allows citizens to have liquor in their cellars if it was laid in before prohibition became effective. There was no limit on character and quantity. This provision makes law violations easy for it is difficult to prove that any liquor found in a man's cellar was not put there before 1920. As long as the ingredients may be readily procured it is thus easy for the private citizen to keep his cellar equipped. As long as he does not sell to his neighbors the law finds it almost impossible to touch him.

BRIEF NEWS

Teachers Make Annual Report
Of the 153 school teachers employed in Polk county during the past school term practically all of them have forwarded their final reports to the office of the county superintendent of schools. The reports are quite comprehensive in their scope and cover all details of school affairs. Among the points covered are the pupils who have attended the school; grades of each pupil; pupils neither absent nor tardy during the term; truancy cases reported; number of books in school library; number visits by county superintendent, parents and school board; pupils moving from district; number and name of pupils living permanently in district; teacher's name and what certificate she holds, whether she or he is graduate of standard college, normal school or has taken examination. It is the duty of the county superintendent to check over these reports



and embody them in a report to the office of the state superintendent of schools.

School Records In

Information obtained from the office of the county superintendent of schools, Josiah Wills, state that of all the schoolclerks in Polk county Wynn Dyer of district 37 was the first in the county that completed his reports and books and sent them in to the superintendent's office for auditing. A. G. Rempel, clerk of district 72, followed him but a short time. The law requires that all books, records and accounts of the school clerk be audited annually and this will be done in the superintendent's office by a competent, certified accountant.

Fair Money Raised

County Treasurer H. B. Cosper has received from the office of the secretary of state a check for the sum of \$684.42, this amount being the state's apportionment to Polk county for county fair purposes. This apportionment is somewhat lower than that of last year which amounted to \$1020.52.

Dallas To Have New Gymnasium

Monday's school election held in Dallas resulted in the re-election of Dr. A. B. Starbuck, and the election of Mrs. Harry H. Belt. Mrs. Ora Cosper, the retiring member expressed an unwillingness to have her name put up for re-election, but received six votes from the hands of the electors. Dr. Starbuck is at present the chairman of the board.

The tax levy for \$35,920 carried by a good-sized majority, the vote being 55 in favor and 17 against it. This levy included the sum of \$4500 to be used for the purpose of erecting a gymnasium. The same amount was included in the levy last year with \$9000 available for gymnasium construction purposes.

Coal to Newcastle

Washington is coming to Oregon to buy certain kinds of timber. A buyer representing Seattle interests was in Dallas this week purchasing piling for Seattle ports. He offered good prices and closed a number of deals while in the county for material to be delivered at any point on the Willamette river. Last week a timber 101 ft. long was delivered in Dallas which will be used as a flag pole.
