PREPARE SUMMARY OF POLK RESOURCES

County Assessor Fred H. Holman and his deputy are now engaged in adding and preparing the annual summary consisting of tillable and non-tillable acres in the county, improvements on same, town and city lots and improvements, improvements on land not deeded or patented, logging roads, shares of stock, manufacturing machinery, merchandise, hotel and office furnishing, money, notes and accounts, tractors, farm implements, horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine and dogs.

This summary does not include railroads, such as public carriers and other public service corporation assessments which are made by the state tax commission and entered on the assessment roll about the first of December. Mr. Holman expects to have the summary finished about August 1.

Independence Ku Klux Active
A fiery red cross, presumed to be an emblem of the Ku Klux Klan, was displayed on the night of July 4th just on the outskirts of Independence on the highway leading to Monmouth. It was about 30 feet in height, with a cross arm of 10 or 12 feet. It was electrically operated, flaming red globes of a large size being used. Juice was turned on at dark and was kept on all during the night.

It caused much comment and attracted not a little attention. It started in motion all kinds of rumors regarding the klan, some of these being to the effect that Independence has a klan with a membership estimated from 150 to 250. So far as could be ascertained there was no one near the cross, and as to whether the cross was put there by the klan seems to be purely speculative but quite generally accepted as such.—Independence Enterprise.

Value of Tourist Trade
The value to Sheridan of tourist travel is revealed in statistical information and deductions. The nearest gasoline filling station to the east is at Bellevue, the nearest to the west, Willamina. The distance between those two points is nine miles. By actual count more than 1000 foreign cars pass through Sheridan daily east and west bound. That is, the 1000 cars travel 9000 miles from Bellevue to Willamina, and their maximum consumption of gasoline is 450 gallons, which, at the prevailing price of 23 cents a gallon means that \$103.50 is spent in Sheridan for gasoline every day. That is what out of town people, mostly tourists, leave here. As a matter of fact the amount is far greater. Sheridan being midway to the coast, is the filling station point. Cars coming over the mountains replenish their supply before going on into the valley. Cars from down valley points replenish their supply here before going on over the mountains. Gasoline men say that Sheridan, because of its being a division point, gleans \$230 a day from gasoline consumption. That may be a magnified sum but split the difference with the more conservative estimate and the result is of startling magnitude to those who have never thought of it before.—Sheridan Sun.

Swimming Hole Saved
Doubts as to whether the old swimming hole at the city park would longer be used by the public were cleared away when Mayor Walter S. Muir secured the consent of the new owner, Mr. Cole, to the place, which is just outside the city park limits, for the public to continue using it as a bathing pool. It is understood, however, that there is to be no trespassing on Mr. Cole's fields adjoining and no damage done to his fences or other property.—Itemizer.

Cupid Loafed in June
June as "the month of brides" was a dismal failure as far as Polk county is concerned. Only seven marriage licenses were issued at the office of the county clerk during that month, as compared to eight in May and thirteen in April.—Itemizer.

Twins Born—One Dies
Twins—a boy and a girl—were born to Mr. and Mrs. Ed Campbell at the Dallas hospital, Sunday morning. The little boy died seven hours later. The mother and the other child are well.
