BRIDE CURED OF HOMESICKNESS

Made Statement Which Made Her Husband Once Again a War-Mad Killer.

Los Angeles, Cal.—Homesickness is at the center of the tragic case of Yvonne Wilnot, Belgian war bride of this city. It overwhelmed her love for her husband, provoked affection for a bachelor neighbor, drove her to the verge of suicide, and then shattered a triangle of happiness with a pistol shot. The aftermath will come with the trial of Scott Wilnot, her husband, charged with shooting Paul Peters, the bachelor interloper.

Yvonne, when only sixteen years old, became a bride of Wilnot, who was suffering from shell shock in a Belgian hospital. That was five years ago. Wilnot and his bride came to America and began living in a small house in this city. Wilnot, between frequent periods of illness, worked as a clerk.

Bachelor Next Door.

Yvonne became homesick. Her husband was working all of the time when he was not ill. He had no time to comfort her. Peters, who lived next door, attracted her and gained her confidence. She gave him her jewels, linen, tea set—and finally left her home for him.

All this she set forth in a lurid confession which she signed and gave her husband. She threatened to drown herself. Wilnot read the statement and fainted. Four hours later he went to Peters with a gun.

Peters ran from the white-lipped fighter. Wilnot fired a shot, and Peters surrendered, with blood stream-

ing over his arm. He, too, with the pistol at his heart, signed the confession. Then he had Wilnot arrested. The veteran pleaded that he was suffering from a nervous shock when he shot Peters. The bachelor denies the truth of the confession. All will be settled in court soon.

But Yvonne is cured of her homesickness. She will not go back to her beloved Belgium. She hopes for her husband's vindication as the basis for a full reconciliation.

"I go where he goes and share what he has," is her purpose.

Community Building

"Waste" for Which There Is No Necessity, and Which It Is Easy to Eliminate.

You have observed homes nearing completion and noted unused lumber lengths, studs, joists, flooring, bricks, short ends strewn "helter skelter" around the house and lot. These "left overs" usually provide the home owner with kindling wood for several years to come. At \$30 per thousand feet this makes mighty expensive fuel. Sometimes this waste amounts to as much as the first year's interest on the home building investment. In nearly all cases this waste is unjustified. If the home is yours, you pay for it.

Another important source of waste is the unnecessary use of elaborate finish and expensive equipment in small homes. You can select a type wholly out of comparison, so far as expense is concerned, with the cost of the home. You can build an extravagant, complicated roof, you can overload your home with unnecessary meaningless details, such as monstrous brackets, wide, projecting eaves, heavy cornices and "frilly" things which have the appearance of being fillers or "stuck on" in an attempt to secure architectural effects.

Much of this has little or no architectural merit, renders no service, detracts from the beauty of the home, and certainly piles up the total costs to unjustified amounts. Details of this character and special equipment frequently require special knives and extra mill work.

"Extras" are things which many home builders can do without and in no way interfere with the beauty, service or comfort of the home. It is worth while to remember these things and see that your home plans are designed to eliminate waste.

Farm Reminders

Crop rotation in valley soils, including legumes, are essential to keeping up soil fertility, particularly nitrogen and organic matter, economically, reports the O. A. C. Experiment station. Manure and crop residue have been highly profitable and are best used before resort is made to commercial fertilizers.

By using up the general application of poison mean for earwig control with small amounts of poison bait applied to trees, walls, and other places the insects climb at night is recommended by the Oregon experiment station specialists. This bait is good to catch the insects as they begin their climb at night.

In actual yield of milk the cows fed silage at the O. A. C. station ranked as follows: those fed oats and vetch first, corn next, and sunflower last. Difficulty was found in getting the cows to eat the sunflower silage readily.

Abortion free cows are easily infected when pregnant. Eight pregnant heifers were penned with three cows that aborted while running together in the O. A. C. lots, and five of them aborted. Further tests showed that either pasturing or penning pregnant animals with abortion-infected cows may infect the sound animals. The recommendation is to keep pregnant stock from infected stock and infected premises.

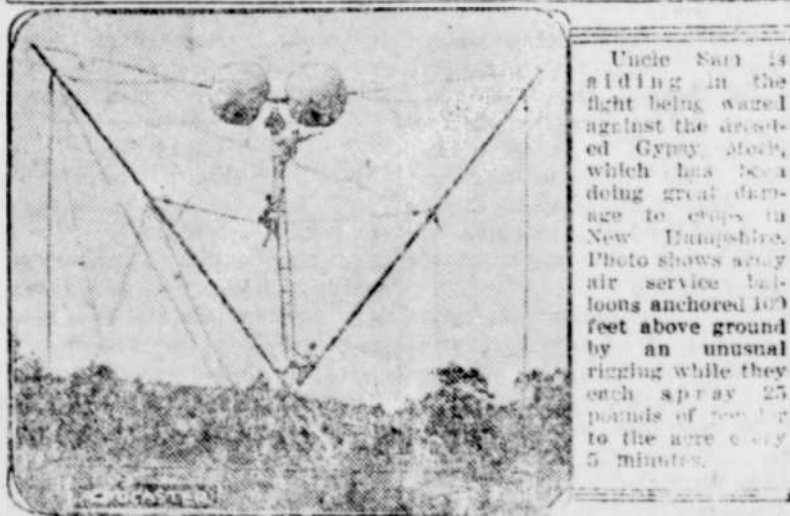
Dried prunes should have 18 to 20 per cent moisture on coming from the new O. A. C. type of recirculation drier. Fruit dried in this way feels moister to the touch than when dried the old way. Keeping exact time on a "batch" that is just right will afford a reliable index on time of drying.

Field tomatoes keep well in cold storage and lose but little weight when handled with care. The average loss was only 2 per cent in a period of 26 days in test conducted by the horticultural department of O.A.C. The chance for coloration during storage is small. High temperature during storage causes the fruit to "sweat" readily and break down.

Crown borers may be found and destroyed in the summer and fall by finding and removing the girdled or wilted canes that are infected. This can well be done at the time of removing the old canes of loganberry, blackberry, and raspberry. If the borer has gone into the crown too deeply to come away with the cane, the O. A. C. station says it may be removed with a short, heavy wire carried looped over the belt.

Potato fields so weedy or so damaged by insects as to make inspection exceptionally difficult will not be accepted for certification by representatives of the O. A. C. Extension service. Extremely poor soil and uneven and weak stands are other conditions that may disqualify.
