READY TO FLY AROUND WORLD

Army Air Service Has Tentative Route Already Planned.

MONEY ALL THAT'S NEEDED

The army air service is ready to start an airplane on a flight around the world as soon as it can secure enough money from congress to make such a trip possible. Tentative plans have already been figured out by government authorities.

The first stop of the airplane when it leaves Bolling field, near the national capital, will be at Detroit, according to the present scheme.

From Detroit the flight will be resumed across the lower portion of Canada to Alaska and the Aleutian Islands. The exact landing places in these regions have not been determined, but the shortest route will be selected across the Bering sea, which would bring the plane to Kamchatka, and in a favorable position to fly over the Sea of Oshotak and into Vladivostok. Of course the attitude of the Bolsheviki would have to be considered and perhaps a change made in the plans of crossing Siberia.

From either Vladivostok or Japan the flight would be along the coast of China to Singapore, thence across the Bay of Bengal and the Dokhan of India to Bombay. From this city the route already laid out by British military airmen would be followed. This route would take the Americans across Mesopotamia, up the Mediterranean to Marseilles and then to Paris and London. From England to the United States either the Azores course would be selected or the Greenland-Canada

British airmen have already made flights across Mesopotamia and to India and Australia, and the trip across the Atlantic has also been made by several flyers so that the only portion of the world route which has not yet been tested is that across the Bering sea and the coast of China.

Trip to Cover 30,000 Miles.

Experts estimate that the proposed trip will cover about 30,000 miles, and that it will require four months' travel at the minimum. This latter estimate is based on the recent flight from San Antonio to Porto Rico and return, a trip which covered 6,000 miles and required a month, although the actual flying time was only 61 hours.

The opinion prevails that a speed of 100 miles per hour can be maintained by the flyers and that they will average only about five hours actual flying per day. On that basis it will require 60 days to make the trip without making any stops. As a matter of fact it is estimated that at least 50 or 60 stops will be made, which will average one day each.

It has developed that while the flight to Porto Rico was helpful in giving a line on the equipment neces eary for a long tourney by air and was excellent training and experience for the personnel, it was in no sense preliminary to the round-theworld journey. In making the flight to Porto Rico time was not an element and the flyers were permitted to rest and relax in Porto Rico.

On the other hand, those who are discussing the proposed round-theworld trip realize that many unavoidable delays may occur during the journey which will consume considerable

Army flyers believe that the T-2, the remodeled thick-wing monoplane in which Lieutenants Kelly and Mc-Cready of the air service set new world records for distance, is suitable for a flight around the world. Certain additional modifications may be necessary to accomplish such a long flight or it may be decided to construct a larger plane along the lines of the T-2.

Ask Congress for Money.

However, before the experiment can be carried out it will be necessary for congress to make a substantial appropriation for that purpose. It is estimated that it will cost from \$200,-000 to \$300,000 to properly equip an airplane to make the long journey and to establish the necessary oil, gas and repair stations along the route.

There are no funds now available for that purpose. Practically all of the money appropriated for the next fiscal year will be needed to replace lost, obsolete and disabled planes, so that it will be necessary for congress to be more generous in its appropriation for the army air service next year than during the last session.

In view of the renewed discussion of the probable importance the airplane will play in the next war, and the recognition of that possibility by other nations in the way of increased appropriations for the air service, army officials in charge of the air service believe sufficient funds will be provided to carry out the proposed experiment and to make others of equal importance.

Army officials say that it is very necessary to work out plans which will insure the safe journey of airplanes on long and sustained trips. Other nations, they claim, are making great headway in that direction, so that in the event of war an air base of great potentiality could be established far from the scene of hostilities. The nation which develops macitives and pilots capable of making long flights successfully will have a decided advantage over the less progressive nation, army/officials argue.



MAKE USE OF SHRUBBERY

Back Yard May Be Made a Thing of Beauty by the Judicious Use of Trees and Vines.

Step into your back yard and look in six directions-north, east, south, west, up and down. You are fortunately situated if there is in more than one of these directions a view that cannot be improved. The view up is likely to be charming, and the view down, if you have a good lawn, will be. But in the other four directions, it is likely there are pictures which you would not care to have framed on the walls of your living room.

Where this is the case, the elimination of these views is the first object of garden planning. The boundaries of the private area must be determined. Allow for a vegetable garden, either within this area, or adjoining it, in a location which enjoys the maximum of sun possible. The service area for domestic uses must also be set aside unless the premises are too limited for that. And when this is done, plantings to screen the private area from the outside world, or such of it as may be undesirable to the view, may be

Usually shrubbery with a few trees for accents and shade will furnish the most pleasing boundary planting. But where space is much confined lattice or board fences, to be covered with vines or even left uncovered, may be used to advantage. Use the fence if shrubbery threatens to encroach upon the flower borders or central lawn; for the chief interest of the garden will not be found in the trees and shrubs; it will be in the flowers, and the activities which may be enjoyed on the lawn.

Selfish Citizens.

There are in both towns and cities men who will not go along unless they can see some special personal benefit to accrue from the efforts they are asked to make. In towns this sort of citizen is sometimes a distinct liability and has to be made over into an asset; in cities, however, he can frequently be ignored, and is unless politics is so rotten that he has to be given a share. In both towns and cities this sort of chap is sometimes shrewd, crafty, and numerous enough to get his chestnuts pulled out of the fire for him, and in the larger cities to assume leadership and control the situation, as is the case in New York city.
