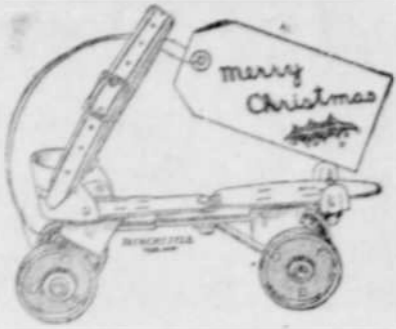

OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The Albany Kiwanis club has been organized with more than 50 charter members.

During the month of October the Portland police department made a total of 1896 arrests.

The County Judges' and Commissioners' association of Oregon will hold its annual session in Salem January 4, 5, and 6.

Bend's school census, as yet incomplete, will show the city to have a population of 9000, City Superintendent Ager declares.

W. G. Flett, well known pioneer of eastern Oregon, died at his homestead on Rock creek, 16 miles from Condon, at the age of 81 years.

For the first time in more than a year there is a large surplus in Salem, according to officials of the federal employment office.

At a recent meeting of friends and members of the Congregational church at Rainier it was voted to build a new church to cost \$20,000 on the site of the present structure.

Fire losses in Oregon for the month of October exclusive of the city of Portland, aggregated \$1,087,375, according to a report issued by Will Moore, state fire marshal.

Mrs. Gladys Moore Burnett, wife of George H. Burnett, superintendent of the Warren Construction company, was fatally burned at Taft as the result of a coal oil explosion.

The federal bureau of public roads will use funds left over from other projects and complete the unfinished portion of the Scottsburg-Reedsport section of the Umpqua highway.

In final settlement of the 1922 pool, checks totaling \$105,000 were mailed last week by the Oregon co-operative

grain growers, according to a statement by A. H. Lea, general manager.

Representatives of the Union County Oil company have selected the Duncan McDonald ranch, three miles from Alicel, as the site for their first oil well, drilling of which will begin at once.

After serving through 40 months of the world war with the Canadian corps and coming through safely, James McDonald, 27, met his death by drowning in a pond at Camp 14, near Estacada.

The Southern Pacific company, according to a report filed with the public service commission now has a surplus of 33 open cars. The shortage of closed cars has been reduced to 272.

The state tax commission has completed the county tax ratios for the year 1923. These ratios represent the per cent of taxable to full cash value of property generally in each county as determined by the state tax commission.

In order to prevent damage being done to the county roads during the wet season, the Douglas county court has issued an order limiting the loads which trucks may transport on county thoroughfares.

William Eib, charged with first degree murder for the killing of his wife at their home in West Linn in September last, was found guilty by a jury at Oregon City and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

There were five fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending November 23, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were: H. D. Fountain, Riverside, l. l. logger; Floyd Bateman, Valseit, cook tender; S. S. Duncan, Portland, forest patrol worker; James McDonald, Estacada, laborer, and James Brecht, aborer, Carleton. A total of 740 accidents were reported during the week.
