Eligible to Teach

New York.—Qualified to teach in the schools of Los Angeles, Cal., Miss Elizabeth Benson, nine years old, has arrived in this city to enter high school as a freshman. Miss Benson, it is admitted, is the queen of all the infant prodigies.

Elizabeth was given a mentality test in Los Angeles last year. She made a mark of 2.14, the highest ever recorded. She cannot be tested further for she broke the scale. The previous high record was 1.88. Under a test given teachers in the Los Angeles schools, Elizabeth made a mark of 86, as against an average of 87.5 for the 694 teachers who took part, making her mentally capable of teaching in a city high school.
