Second place went to Coquille and third to Lebanon. The booths were judged on representatives of community, 40 points; appearance and advertising value to community, 30 points each. Students

chosen by the various chambers of the main part of the Independence commerce arranged the booths. A wagon loaded with hops, hop house and pickers tents complete the hop yard atmosphere. Bags of hops scattered about, formed Flouring mill products, canned beets and carrots, butter, dried prunes and floral displays furnished the background of the booth.
