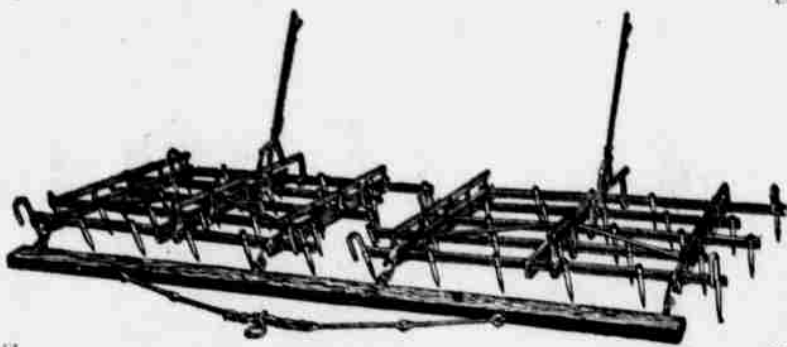

As student and school teacher he was always seeking first hand information on local history.
