of a German Moratorium. Paris.-The departure for London of the British members of the experts committees, has given rise to reports that foundamental differences have cropped out in the work of the experts and that the British representatives have gone to consult their goverment.

It was stated officially that no serious disagreement existed, and that while different opinions have been expressed in the course of the discussions the report now being drafted will be signed unanimously by both committees. The question of a moratorium is reported to be the point upon which opinions diverge.

Officially, however, the correspondents are informed that "the work of the experts is proceeding in complete accord on fundamental points," and that the joint report of the Dawes and McKenna committees will be ready the first week in April.
