OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Roseburg is to have a strawberry carnival this year on May 22, 23 and 24.

Buildings now under construction at Bend represent a total value of \$80,000.

A new hotel is planned for the town of Marcola, Lane county. It will have 30 rooms.

A company of the Oregon national guard will be organized in Astoria this spring.

Salem's annual blossom festival schedule originally for April 20 was held Sunday.

At a special election at Newport the commission-manager charter was defeated by two votes.

There are now nine women prisoners in the federal ward of the Oregon state penitentiary.

Recent rains and stormy weather have retarded farming operations considerably in Walla Walla county.

The annual district convention of the Yamhill county Rebekahs was held at Dayton with a representative attendance of about 200.

A branch of the national organization known as the Lutheran Brotherhood was organized at Silverton with a charter membership of 50.

The city of North Bend has a large improvement program on hand for this summer and more than 30 blocks of paving will be laid before fall.

Herman Larsen, a rancher of western Lane county, has received from the county a bounty of \$47.50 on 19 seals killed in the Pacific ocean.

James A. Barker was killed instantly when the eight-horse team he was driving to a plow on the ranch of O. H. Reeder of Athena ran away.

A new tariff of the Oregon-California Power company, which increase slightly some of the rates of the corporation in Oregon, became effective as of April 1, according to an order issued by the public service commission. The tariff previously was suspended by the commission pending an investigation.

The McKenzie highway, all the way from Eugene to a point 10 miles west of the summit of the Cascades, with the exception of one short stretch, is now in good condition, according to Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest.

With a membership of about 30 growers, the Elkhorn Mountain Head Lettuce association was organized at Haines. Growers present pledged 107 acres of lettuce for the fall market. The association will market its produce independent of distributing companies.

J. W. Mayo of the First National bank, Stayton, was elected president of the Marion County Bankers' association at a meeting in Salem. Other officers elected were Charles Reynolds of Silverton, vice-president, and Keith Powell of Woodburn, secretary and treasurer.

The Eugene chamber of commerce has voted unanimously to endorse the measure to be placed on the ballot at the May election to levy a two-mill tax in Lane county to raise money to meet the county's share of the cost of the state highway bridge across the Willamette river at Harrisburg.

Governor Pierce appointed Rev. E. J. Magruder, Rev. J. W. Anderson, Mrs. Louise Thomas, Mrs. Beatrice Cannady and Edgar E. Wilson, all of Portland, to represent the state of Oregon at the negro national educational congress to be held in Philadelphia June 16 to 21. Delegates to the congress will pay their own expenses.

There were three fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending April 10, according to a report by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Roy McGill Beach, Devitt, fireman; James Jonsrud, Sandy, rigging man, and Louis Larson, Knappton, foreman. A total of 516 accidents were reported during the week.

Six thousand Oregon cattle that have wintered around Tule lake in California, just south of the Oregon boundary, were moved back into Oregon by their owners following a 24-hour notice of State Veterinarian Lytle of the closing down of an ironclad embargo against all California stock coming into Oregon, as a precaution against the hoof and mouth disease.

Fire of undetermined origin wiped out the Bly hotel at Bly and patrons of the two-story frame structure were forced to leap from upper windows to save their lives, despite the efforts of a volunteer bucket brigade. Two residences adjoining the hotel were likewise destroyed. The Bly hotel was an old landmark in the Sprague river country east of Klamath Falls. The loss is estimated at \$10,000, with no insurance.

Emigrant movables shall not be shipped from California into Oregon unless accompanied by a federal or state certificate certifying that the same have been properly cleaned and disinfected, according to a proclamation issued by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian. The proclamation was in connection with the fight being made against the hoof and mouth disease which is raging in California.

A system of week-day Bible study in the public schools of Oregon is being developed by the state and will be launched in Oregon, in a small way, at least, next fall, declared J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, in an address before the Lane County Sunday School association in session at Central Presbyterian church in Eugene.

A fund, not to exceed \$25,000, was asked of the state emergency board at its meeting Monday by the state sanitary livestock commission to be used, if necessary, in policing the California-Oregon line to insure enforcement of the quarantine which this state has placed against the products of that state to prevent the spread of the foot and mouth disease into Oregon.

The first timber wolves to be caught in Oregon for some time were taken in a trap on Evans creek in Josephine county last week, according to Stanley G. Jewett, predatory animal inspector of the United States biological survey. After months of hunting to eradicate a family of the almost extinct species, three were caught and killed in one week by Harry Stokes, predatory animal hunter.

The state grain inspection department, which at the last session of the legislature was taken from the jurisdiction of the public service commission and placed under the direction of the state market agent, is not functioning in the best interest of the public, according to a resolution adopted at Salem by more than 60 members of the Willamette Valley Millers' and Feed Dealers' association.

William M. Pitney, 76, prominent pioneer of Lane county, was killed instantly when Southern Pacific passenger train No. 14, northbound, struck an automobile which he was driving over a crossing on the outskirts of Junction City.

Fifty thousand ballots went out to patrons of all Portland mail routes to be used in the referendum on the question of whether the clerks and carriers of the Portland postoffice shall have Saturday afternoons off from May 1 to October 1.

Ballot title for the initiative measure looking to the abolishment of the Oregon public service commission has been completed by the attorney-general. The measure will be referred to the voters of the state at the general election in November.

At a recent meeting of the Newport chamber of commerce and citizens of Lincoln county, a resolution was unanimously adopted calling for the completion of the Roosevelt highway and the remainder of the roads as proposed by the state highway commission.
