Ailment Kills Cattle

Messrs. L. C. Cline and Ed Vieth, of near Parker, in Polk County were in Corvallis this week consulting O. A. C. authorities regarding a queer disease that is killing their cattle. Mr. Vieth has lost three cows, and Mr. Cline a young heifer. The heifer was seen to stagger and fall, frothing at the mouth, and die almost instantly. An Independence veterinarian says it is a disease, but the farmers thought perhaps it was something poisonous, either in the pasture or the river water. Sheep in the same pasture have not been affected.—Benton County Courier.

While returning from Portland early Monday morning, a car owned by Roy Kullander and driven by Charles Miller, went down an embankment about a mile and a half the other side of Newberg. Mr. Miller was alone and was going about 20 miles an hour. Something went wrong with the mechanism and the car headed for the embankment. He jammed on the brakes. The machine landed on its side at the foot of an 8-foot embankment and headed in the opposite direction from which it was going. Mr. Miller had presence of mind enough to drop to the floor and escaped injury. The top of the car was smashed, a wheel torn to pieces, the windshield smashed and the car pretty much otherwise wrecked.
