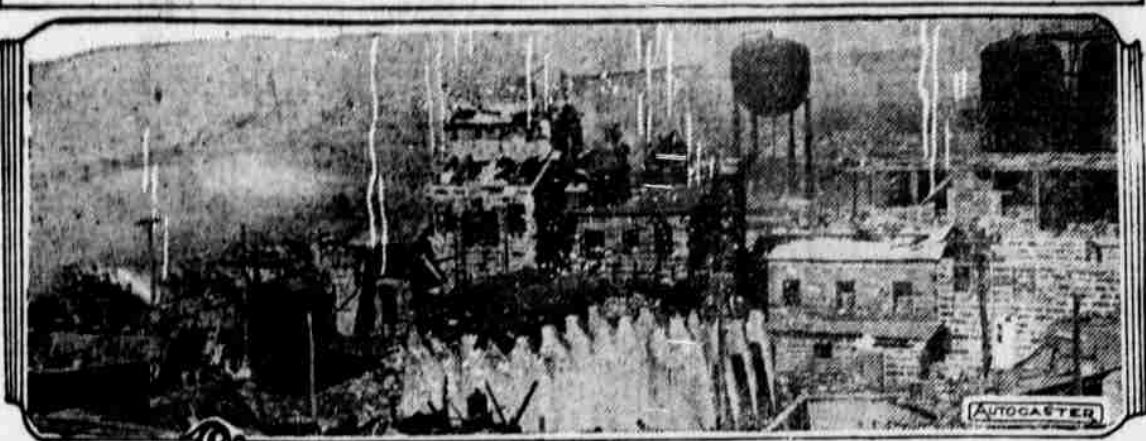


Where 18 Were Killed and 100 Injured by Explosion
