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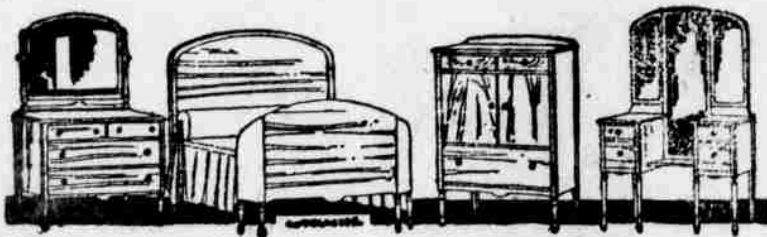

LAMP THAT FOUND TACK IN BABY'S LUNG ON DISPLAY

The smallest and the largest incandescent electric light bulbs ever made are being exhibited at utility conventions. The smallest bulb is the identical lamp used by surgeons in Philadelphia in operating on a baby's lung a few months ago for the removal of a tack that the child had inhaled. This lamp is about one-fourth of an inch long and its filament can be discerned by the naked eye with difficulty. The largest lamp will develop 100,000 candlepower and is lighted with a 120 volt, 250 ampere circuit. It is the largest made, and is used exclusively in movie studios. It generates so much heat that when it is in use it has to have six electric fans blowing upon it to keep it from becoming too hot. Each globe of this size costs \$300. Its operating cost is about \$5.00 per hour. Its filament, drawn into the size used in 25-watt lamps, would supply 55,000 of them.

That radio listeners south of the Equator, in the islands of the South Seas, New Zealand and Australia, may enjoy a better broadcast service from KGO between 10:00 p. m. and 1:00 a. m., it was announced today that beginning Monday, Henry Halstead and his orchestra, playing in the Hotel St. Francis, will be heard on Monday, Tuesday and Saturday nights. Soloists from Halstead's orchestra will play between the regular dance numbers, keeping up a continuous broadcast.

It is winter time now south of the Equator and the best season for radio reception. A difference of 19½ hours in time between New Zealand and the United States makes it difficult for listeners of the Equator to "log the Yanks" unless broadcast after 10 o'clock, Pacific time. However, some reports have been received of KGO regular programs broadcast between 8:00 and 10:00 p. m.

Henry Halstead said that he would appear occasionally himself before the microphone and that various soloists of his orchestra are preparing special numbers to insure a continuous program for the big new audience in the South Seas.
