FARM REMINDERS

Winged forms of the currant aphids begin to appear in the fall in Oregon and fly from bush to bush. The sexed forms evolve and the females lay eggs on the bark where some remain all winter. Aphids hatch from these eggs in the spring as "stem mothers", capable of giving birth to young. Lime sulphur 1 to 20 plus nicotine sulphate 1 to 800, is the standard spray for this pest recommended by the experiment station.

Hungarian vetch, because of its winter hardiness and resistance to over watering, is coming into favor in Oregon as a cover and green manure crop especially in orchards. It has not been winter killed on the experiment station farms or other farms reporting, even at a temperature of 10 degrees, when other vetches were severely damaged.

Proper pruning of the bearing grape vine removes about 90 per cent of the wood—a heavier pruning than is ordinarily given any other fruit. A mature vine making good growth is left the same number of buds it had the previous season in the O. A. C. Experiment station plantings, while a weakened vine is allowed a fewer number of buds. Very vigorous vines are not pruned so heavily but are allowed to expend

more of their energy in fruit production.

Straight, even honey combs made up of worker cells are used in the O. A. C. station apiaries to facilitate handling and increase the output of the colony. It is necessary to use full sheets of foundation in the frames to get this type of comb.

CAPTIVE CODLING MOTHS

SHOW SPRAY TIME NEAR

Captive codling moths indicate by emerging from the pupal stage in the experiment station breeding cages, that their free sisters and brothers in the Willamette valley are doing the same thing. This means that the wild ones will begin laying eggs as soon as the temperature at 8 o'clock in the evening—the "cackle" hour for these pests in Oregon—is not less than 60 degrees.

So it's about spraying time again to get the new worm, expected to be at the hatching peak August 18 to 20 unless chilly and wet weather should set in and delay egg laying and hatching. The spray that is expected to give the new arrivals such a meal as will prove their last, if the weather is normal should go on before August 16, the station specialists say.

This is the third regular codling moth spray, known by growers as the August cover spray. Its date varies with the weather and other conditions, so growers generally have no way of knowing just the right time to apply it. The station learns the time and sends the information to the growers through cooperating newspapers.

The moth and their worm children are so skillful and persistent in their efforts to see the inside of all the

nicest apples that it takes the combined efforts of station, newspapers and growers to prevent their doing it. With the combination working at top speed the worms are barked and turned into tiny bits of fertilizer on the apple or pear leaf before they can reach the fruit.

Field observations are made by the station to "check" on the breeding cage estimates. All indications were that the second generation of moths

would reach their greatest number by the end of last week. The captive moths in the station cages came from pupae transformed from worms that were in little apples picked up from under the trees last May. They go through the same changes and antics as the free ones.

The dosage is often increased in this third spray to 5 pounds of powdered lead arsenate to 200 gallons of water.
