3 1/2 Miles of Paving In Dallas This Year

The original 1924 paving program for Dallas was completed Wednesday, save a few finishing touches, by J. C. Compton, contractor. The work adds approximately 3 1/2 miles of paved streets to the area already paved.

The work has gone forward without mishap or delay and the dry weather has been very favorable to the laying of the paving in good shape.

Bids for a second paving project, involving about eight blocks, will be opened next Monday night by the council and it is expected that this will go to Mr. Compton at approximately the same figure as the work already laid.

The blacktop plant is now due for a shutdown for probably ten days. The street crew, however, can keep on for some days on a part of the proposed project which is covered by waiver, according to Engineer Himes.

A week or ten days should complete the new project when the crew gets to it.

Work is now underway to dismantle the Levens street bridge in Dallas, which will be replaced with a new concrete structure. The tearing down process was held back a bit to allow J. C. Compton to finish his paving contract as it made a closer haul for his trucks.

The new bridge will be completed around October 1. During the time it is out of commission it will work something of a hardship on farmers on the north who team in and out of Dallas. Except on warm days it is difficult to take a team up the highway hill, and practically impossible to haul loads that way. It is possible that some arrangement will be made for a detour route to aid the farmers during the time the new bridge is being built.

The Dallas Water company has a four-inch main crossing the LaCreole at the bridge, supplying North Dallas patrons. Fortunately the system is a circulating one with another main connecting back with the system. The Levens street main has been shut off at the bridge and plugged. It will probably mean that North Dallas pressure will be lower until the bridge is near enough completed to reconnect the main.
