Musk Rat's Adventures

A prospective passenger who wanted a steamship ticket for a trip from Cottage Grove to Portland appeared at the Southern Pacific station a few nights ago. Night Operator Roberts had a hard time convincing the prospective ticket purchaser that there was no water line from Cottage Grove to Portland and that there never had been since the Creator caused the waters to recede from the Willamette valley and leave the oil deposits which are just about to be tapped.

The prospective ticket purchaser was a muskrat who had made his home for some time in the pond at the W. L. & E. mill. Workmen drained the pond Thursday and left the rat without a roof over his head. 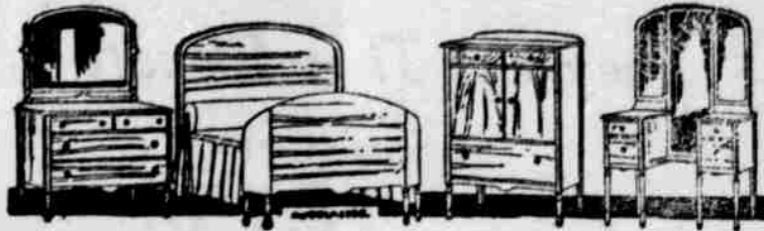
Held for Killing
