The conference held Saturday at the Normal school was one of the most important yet held on the campus. It drew the attention of prominent educators and members of the conference came from a wide stretch of territory. Linfield kicked off and aided by a Normal fumble, slid across for their first touchdown early in the first period. Thrice more they skidded across the goal line before the half ended and they converted two of the extra points for a total of 26 to 0.

The same thing and more of it featured the third quarter. The Pedagogues tried desperately to stem the roaring Preachers from Linfield but they couldn't be stemmed. Five times in the quarter they crossed the Normal goal line for a total of 30 points. The try for an extra point was smeared (both literally and figuratively) every time.

In the final period the Teachers put in some high power fighting and held the Preachers even. Numerous substitutions were made by both sides in the stanza and the reserves proved of equal strength.

Mud hooks and a heavy line gave Linfield the advantage. The mud cleats used by the Preachers told heavily for them in line bucking and permitted them to shove the Teachers about at will.

This game completes the season for O.N.S. with one victory and three defeats.
