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Chinese Worker Talks About Celestial Republic

Miss Argetsinger, who is interested in normal schools in China, gave the seventh and eighth grade pupils a most interesting account of her experiences in China. Responding to the request for information as to how the present trouble in China arose, Miss Argetsinger said it was not altogether the fault of the Chinese. That foreigners tried to sell the natives opium from India, and other things the Chinese government didn't want. That some of these foreigners, because of selfish business interests even controlled the public parks of the people, and posted signs to the effect that Chinese and dogs must stay out.

Miss Argetsinger showed the refining and civilizing influence of religion on the lower classes of people. It was altogether a very instructive talk and delightfully given.
