

The Oregon Geographical Board, appointed by Governor Chamberlain October 1, 1908, had its first meeting in Corvallis on October 28th and organized with the following officers: President, Will G. Steel, Portland; secretary, Joseph Shafer, Eugene; treasurer, J. B. Horner, Corvallis.

The excuse for the creation of this board lies in the fact that in a new state of vast proportions like Oregon population is pushing into new areas and the older sections are becoming more densely populated, giving rise everywhere to new towns, villages and post offices; this calls closer attention to many hitherto disregarded physical features of the countrymountains, streams, waterfalls, lakes, beautiful landscapes along the sea coast or in the interior. Hundreds, even thousands, of new names may be required within the space of a few years. The board will be prepared to assist citizens wishing to apply names to such new places, by furnishing lists of appropriate names drawn from Indian lore, pioneer history, and from other sources. In this manner the results of the earlier "haphazard" method of designating places can be avoided so far as relates to the place names of the fu-
